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Welcome to the Annual Report 2023

I welcome all members of the extended Loreto family to this year's Annual Report.

This annual report presents an overview of the great work that continues to be done in the 32 schools - 18 post-primary, 5 community and 9 primary - that make up the Loreto Network on the island of Ireland. Thankfully, the threats posed by the pandemic have eased considerably in the past twelve months and, as a consequence, school life has pretty well returned to where we were prior to March 2020. This is reflected in the pages that follow as schools outline their highlights over the past year. How refreshing and uplifting they are! We also admire the Trojan work that continues in Loreto, Rumbek in the most difficult of social. political and economic conditions.

I am reluctant to use the phrase that we have "returned to normal". There is no normal when a tragic and needless war is being waged on the continent that we share with our fellow European citizens. Nor can it be business as normal when the very existence of our planet is being challenged by the effects of climate

change. Loreto schools have done a great deal in highlighting and responding to these issues over the last year.

Importantly, however, this must continue with renewed determination in the time ahead as both threats remain real and worrying.

I know, however, that this report can never tell the full story of life in Loreto schools. Whilst most of our students and staff can come to school each day and engage fully, that is not the case for all. Instead, school and work life can be made very difficult by many serious challenges physical or mental illness, family breakups, learning difficulties, financial worries, relationship issues and exclusion, to name but some. I wish to use this welcome to the Annual Report 2023 to say a special word of thanks to all in the Loreto schools who go to great lengths to provide support, guidance and encouragement to those in our midst who need it most. Their work will never make it on to the pages of an annual report but, please be assured, that it is both noted and very deeply appreciated.

Many members of the Loreto family are aware by now of the need to plan for the best possible model of trusteeship into the future. The nature of that model has yet to be determined. Please be assured that the Loreto Education Trust Board will do all



that it can to keep schools in the network fully informed of developments and meaningfully involved before any final decisions are made.

It is a pleasure to pay tribute to the dedicated and highly competent staff who work in the Loreto Education Centre – Caroline, Melissa, Eliza, Sr. Kathleen and Eddie – and also to Sr. Ann who stood down as Director of the Centre in 2022. They continue to deliver a very high standard of support to the entire Loreto network. Indeed, the nature of this support has expanded greatly in recent times in response to the complexities that now exist in the world of education.

I know that the Directors of the Loreto
Education Trust Board will join me in
extending sincere gratitude to the
leadership teams, staff and students who
work so diligently and collaboratively in
our schools and to those who serve in a
voluntary capacity on Boards of
Management/Governors and as members
of parents' associations. The Trust Board
will endeavour to offer all possible support
to Loreto schools in their quest to follow
the directions set in the Mary Ward
Schools Compass to be rooted,
responsive and relevant organisations.

About Us

Loreto schools seek to provide an education that affirms the innate dignity of every human being created in God's image, and fosters the full and harmonious development of each student, encompassing the intellectual, physical, cultural, moral and spiritual aspects in an environment of justice, freedom, sincerity, truth and joy.

Both Mary Ward and Teresa Ball responded to the needs of their time by establishing schools and using the work of education to spread the message of the Gospel. These schools flourished and by the middle of the 20th Century, there were almost thirty schools in Ireland which drew their defining ethos from the spirit of the Loreto Congregation.

Over time lay colleagues shared in the delivery of education, the leadership and management of the schools. The final link in that chain was sharing the Trusteeship of our schools. In 2003 the Congregational Leader and her council established the Loreto Education Trust with responsibility for this Trusteeship.

Both Sisters and lay persons are appointed as Directors of the Trust. Loreto Education Trust serves the schools through the Loreto Education Centre.

Mission Statement of the Trust:

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Holding in trust the gift of Mary Ward's distinctive vision, we undertake trusteeship of the Loreto enterprise of education now and into the future.

Working out of IBVM (Institute of the Blessed Virgin Mary) core values and facilitating their contemporary expression within Loreto Schools, we exercise the function of trusteeship through:

- On-going dialogue with the wider Loreto Community
- Two-way communication with the schools
- Support of the Loreto Network of Schools
- Leadership development



The Trust Board

Annual General Meeting

The Annual General Meeting of the Loreto Education Trust took place on the 14th March 2022 through the Zoom platform, the eighteenth AGM since the Trust was incorporated in 2003. The Annual Report was sent to the Members and Directors before the meeting and later sent to all our educational stakeholders as well as Loreto communities within the Province.

Sr Helen O'Riordan, on behalf of the Members, responded to the Report and her response can be found in the Appendices.

The Future of the Trust

The following correspondence was issued, by Sr. Barbara Murphy IBVM, Province Leader and Billy O'Shea, Chairperson of the Trust, on 1st March 2023, to the Loreto Community and Network together with all Staff and Officers of the Loreto Education Centre.

We write to provide you with an update regarding the ongoing consideration of the future trusteeship of Loreto schools.

You are aware that Members of the Loreto Education Trust (LET) invited school representatives to a meeting in Dublin on 6th December 2021. At the meeting

information relevant to the future governance of Loreto schools was outlined. Details were given of general discussions over a period of time regarding Loreto schools possibly joining the Le Chéile Trust.

Over the last fourteen months the
Members of LET have engaged with
Directors on seven occasions – three
meetings with full Board of Directors and
four meetings at Joint Working Group
level (three Directors and three Members).
The Members also met with a
representative group of the Chairpersons
of Boards of Management three times,
and with a representative group of
Principals on two occasions. Since
December 2021 there have been no
formal conversations, meetings or
negotiations with Le Chéile.

In response to requests for further engagement and information, and at the invitation of schools, the Members are currently visiting Boards of Management. Since September thirteen School Boards have warmly welcomed the sisters and very worthwhile conversations have taken place, with mutual sharing and listening. The main conversation points have centred around Province leadership's rationale for the decision to 'explore and negotiate joining Le Chéile Trust'. Some Boards also shared on local issues that



are impacting their school. Visits to school Boards will continue over the next few weeks with the aim of concluding at Easter time.

After Easter there will be a full assessment of all aspects of current circumstances relevant to the future governance of Loreto schools. Concerns raised and suggestions made at all meetings will feed into this assessment and the ongoing discernment process. A professional financial appraisal will be conducted in the coming weeks. It is our intention to engage the services of PwC to assist us in these tasks.

The Province Leadership Team and the Trust Board will work closely together as the process continues. We fully appreciate the importance of this matter to all of us in the Loreto family, and we will keep you informed of developments.

Please feel free to share the contents of this letter with the members of your school community as you see fit.

In the meantime, the great work being done by all in our Loreto schools will continue as normal.

As Patrons and Trustees we are diverse in terms of individual histories and founding intentions but we are united in the belief that the education of the whole person must include deep questions about the purpose and meaning of life and that the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus guide the answers we offer. We support freedom of educational choice where the state provides funding for education while parents can choose those faith schools that reflect their wishes and hopes for their children.

APTCS Website

The Members of the APTCS Trust Board are representative of all the Trusts, the Catholic Education Partnership and the Secretariat of Secondary Schools.

Responsibility for funding the association rests with the Patrons /Trustees. The new



company in consultation with its members has revised its Constitution and Memorandum of Association and is now a registered charity.

The Chairperson and Board of APTCS, together with the CEO, Dr Eilis
Humphreys, prioritise the trusteeship of



Director of Education and Leadership Report



The Australian Loreto Annual in 1958 offers us an interesting insight into the Loreto education mission at that moment in time. Much excitement and anticipation was evident as Mother General Pauline Dunne (Loreto Abbey, Rathfarnham) was due to visit Loreto schools in Australia. What struck me in perusing the extensive annual was how little Loreto education has changed in those 65 years! The 1958 Annual is context and time specific giving us a snapshot of what it was like to be a Loreto student at that time, but also offering a glimpse into the societal culture of the day. This is one of the reasons why our Annual Reports and School Yearbooks are so important for future generations, who may wish to look back at what Loreto schools were like in the first quarter of this century. These annual publications are like time machines, in that they take us back to a lived reality that is, on the one hand so familiar to us, and on the other hand speaks of a different country, culture and continent. However, what is familiar sixty five years later is the language on ethos, the same expression of the Loreto charism that we reference today, the same commitment to sport, music, debating, tours, community, student leadership, academic excellence and students leaning into the world with an ethic of social justice.



So what is happening in our schools in 2023? We started back to school in September with a tentative hope that the upcoming academic year would truly be a turning, a return to the vibrancy of school life and some solid ground on which we could provide the holistic, educational experience so defining of the Loreto network of schools. Almost seven months later, I am pleased to say that this hope has been fully realised and our school communities are flourishing with teaching, learning, extra and co-curricular activities, community events and in Mary Ward's words, 'right relationships'!

This short report will offer only a flavour of the activities our schools have participated in, the many achievements, endeavours and successes over the last year. It will also, I hope, give an insight into my role with the schools and the wider educational community.

As the schools began to fully interface with the outside world, it was our school staff who made everything possible again, ably encouraged and empowered by our senior leaders. I want to use the opportunity of this Annual Report to acknowledge and thank the staff in the schools who so generously and selflessly volunteer their time to coach, manage, organise, plan, mentor and lead so many of the wonderful opportunities students have, to participate in activities outside of the classroom. The level of volunteerism and dedication of our school staff is nothing short of remarkable and was

highlighted even more acutely upon the return of these activities, post covid.

Also, in conversation and meetings with our guidance counsellors, year heads, tutors, chaplains, pastoral teams and additional learning needs teams, Special Needs Assistants (SNAs) and Home School Liaison Coordinators (HSLC), it is inspiring to hear of the care and support offered to our students every day.

I want to acknowledge and thank them all for the way in which they scaffold the children and young people with kindness, compassion and support. Despite the fact that schools are under resourced in these vital areas of pastoral care, additional learning needs and counselling, our staff and leadership teams make up some of the shortfall with their care and dedication.

What is very clear from our conversations about schools and students is that there is an emergence of new challenges and issues, post covid, that are only beginning to manifest into tangible problematic aspects of young people's lives. There is an urgent need for our political leaders to turn their attention to these emerging issues before schools are overwhelmed and we see a generation of children and



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young people irreversibly impacted by the tsunami of post pandemic problems, challenges and issues. Mental health, resilience and student well-being are emerging as key issues with students. Stress, work life balance and navigating the complexity of school life are priority concerns for teachers and leaders.

On a positive note, despite the many societal, social, financial and psychological challenges that have come to the fore this year, our schools never fail to bring joy, celebration and pride.

The participation and success in the sports and extracurricular competitions this year has been quite extraordinary, with Loreto schools reaching and winning finals at County and National levels in all codes and events.



Gone are the days where schools only provide a limited range of activities; the range of sports students have participated in this academic year is testament to that. It has been a busy year of sport across all our schools with activities including rugby, GAA, hockey, badminton, athletics,

basketball, camogie, soccer, yoga, show jumping, sailing, rock climbing and orienteering.



November was a particularly busy month with a number of events taking place across the Loreto Schools Network.

The inaugural Loreto Olympics, hosted by Loreto Abbey Secondary School, Dalkey, saw teams of 6 from Letterkenny, Kilkenny, Balbriggan, Foxrock, Stephen's Green, Bray, Beaufort and Mullingar, participate in a range of fun challenges and tasks across the day. Congratulations to Loreto, Dalkey who won the competition and thank you to Jane Coyne, Dalkey Sports Coordinator, and the talented TYs for coordinating the entire event.





It is an accepted fact, at this stage, that our conferences are top class experiences. Eliza's attention to detail and event management skills contribute hugely to their success.



Student Council Conferences

A specified goal within the National Children's Strategy is children and young people shall be given a voice in matters which affect them. To this end within a school, a Student Council represents the voice of the student on school matters and has the responsibility to use this voice for the good of the school.

The Loreto Education Centre provides, through our Loreto Network Student Council Co-ordinators, training opportunities for students and liaison teachers. This year's network training day took place in November with 17 secondary

schools coming together online on the morning of 15th November and 6 primary schools on the morning of 24th November.

The theme for the two events was Diversity, Inclusion and Community. Representatives from each school were asked to suggest two ideas for their year plan and to summarise how they hope to continue to embed the theme of diversity and inclusion into their work for the year.

The meetings also saw Sinéad Giblin and Maírín O'Toole explore the role of the Student Council and the 'student voice', the format of a productive meeting through a 'Meeting in Action' and the sharing of good practice and ideas.

The online events also included a brief session for the Student Council Liaison Teachers in the schools, giving them the opportunity to ask questions, share ideas and give consideration as to how they can support their Student Council.

Whilst it is hoped to return to an in-person conference next year the online format ensures as many schools as possible can attend and I am delighted to say we had great attendance. The Student Councils within our schools are extremely proactive and we continue to be inspired and impassioned by the range of activities undertaken. Thank you to everyone who attended and contributed to the events.

Thank you also to the school liaison teachers for all that they do to support the Student Council in their schools and for encouraging student voice. They are truly inspiring!



Debates

March 2022 saw the preliminary rounds of the Senior and Junior Debates with the finals taking place, via Zoom, on 18th May 2022. The online forum in no way detracted from the wonderful debating programme we have become used to.



The Junior Final Motion, in keeping with the fact that 2022 was the European Year of Youth, was 'That this house would lower the voting age in Ireland to 16' whilst the Final Motion for the Senior Debates was 'That this house would end Ireland's policy of military neutrality'.



The preliminary and final rounds saw the students show their considerable debating skills, with all teams making a convincing case, clearly explaining their position and responding to the arguments and contests of their opponents. We experienced some spirited, lively debating with students speaking in earnest, confidently and calmly, whilst always considerate of others views.

In the Junior competition, the motion in Round 1 was, 'This house would ban homework for all primary school students' and in Round 2, 'This house believes smartphones are making us dumb'. As in all previous competitions, the



third motion was only shared with students prior to the commencement of Round 3 and the three agreed topic areas where Young People, Education and Society.

We were delighted to welcome Loreto Grammar School, Omagh who joined at Junior level for the first time.

The finals took place in person, kindly hosted by Loreto High School, Beaufort, on 21st March. After a strongly debated semi-final, teams from Foxrock, Kilkenny and Beaufort progressed to the Junior Final with teams from Beaufort and Kilkenny progressing to the Senior Final.



The motion for the Junior Final was 'This House would ban advertising of unhealthy foods to adults and children' whilst the Motion for the Senior Final was 'This House believes Ireland is no longer a land of Céad Míle Fáilte.

Her passion for and energy for public speaking and debates has contributed to many students going on to use this valuable skill in their careers.

Personal Wellness

I would like to thank Máiread McNally, (Loreto Secondary School, Balbriggan), for the wonderful work that she carries out in her role as Loreto Wellbeing Coordinator. Her experience as a Chaplain and the work that she has carried out in relation to National programmes with Sinéad McGrath and NUIG ensures that she brings a wealth of expertise and knowledge to the role. Máiread's report below will give you an



insight into the work that she has been carrying out on behalf of Loreto Schools.

Loreto Wellbeing Coordinators Report

This academic year as Wellbeing
Coordinator I have established a
successful working relationship with
schools, in particular with School
Principals and Wellbeing Coordinators in
schools.

I have developed a resource sharing platform via Padlet that Wellbeing Coordinators have access too. This includes Wellbeing Guidelines for Junior Cycle, CPD courses with BeLonGTo, suggestions for guest speakers for schools on wellbeing, teacher wellbeing resources and documents pertaining wellbeing in schools, both at primary and post primary level.

In my role as Wellbeing Coordinator I have been assisting School Leaders and Wellbeing Coordinators in areas of wellbeing. Most of the questions that I have been liaising with Wellbeing Coordinators with are relation to Relationships and Sexuality Education and queries on training and CPD for supporting transgender students and training for staff on Stand Up Awareness Week, which celebrates the inclusion of students who are LGBTQI+, and advice for staff training on supporting students

who are members of the LGBTQI+ community.



I have supported School Management on staff wellbeing. Some of the concerns were around staff being happy in the workplace as they impart much of themselves to their students. In this we explored the overall wellbeing of the person as an employee, considering the work space, the staff room, wellbeing wall for staff, financial wellness and I recommended a guest speaker- Declan Coyle who has developed a one day staff workshop called The Green Platform, this workshop aims to boost staff positivity, happiness and growth- both at a personal and a professional level.



In response to the number of queries on the delivery of effective RSE and also looking at the overall wellbeing of students



in Loreto schools in terms of RSE-I organised a talk with Sinéad McGrath, Sinéad is a trained midwife and nurse. She has worked with NUIG on the Active Consent Programme as a researcher and facilitator and subsequently developed RSE workshops for delivery at post primary level. The talk included information about the challenges to young people's wellbeing in relation to effective Relationship and Sexuality Education. Sinéad spoke from her experience of the delivery of the RSE workshops in Loreto Schools across the country. She showed the types of questions that young people are asking and spoke about the importance of empowering the students with knowledge in the area of RSE and the impact this can have on their overall wellbeing. The feedback from this talk was very positive and it helped Principals, Deputy Principals, Pastoral Care Staff and well Coordinators get a clearer understanding if where the students' needs are in relation to RSE.

Before the end of this academic year I will be circulating a training manual for Wellbeing Coordinators to use with wellbeing student leaders in their schools. The vision is that students who are wellbeing prefects in schools would attend a training session with their school Wellbeing Coordinator. This team of students would then assist the teacher assigned to the role of wellbeing coordinator with various wellbeing events

in the school. As the role of wellbeing coordinator is still relatively new in the schools, I believe this model would be an effective way of promoting wellbeing amongst staff and the student body, encouraging a more whole school approach to the area of wellbeing.

Estelle McGoldrick IBVM, RIP

It was with deep sadness that we received the news of the death of Sister Estelle McGoldrick on 1 November 2022, RIP. Having attended Loreto College, North Gt George's Street for her second level education, Philomena entered the Novitiate in Loreto Abbey, Rathfarnham on 4 November 1966, taking the name 'Estelle' the mere mention of which will evoke very happy memories for all those who knew and loved her over so many years. Following her Third Level studies, Estelle taught in Loreto, Balbriggan, as a teacher of Business Studies, and subsequently lived and ministered in St Stephen's Green, Rathfarnham, Beaufort House, Casa Loreto in Rome and Greenville Road.

From the mid 1990's, Estelle was at the very heart of the Loreto Network of schools but would never have taken credit for the extraordinary impact which her presence and warmth of personality had on all those for whom she was the first point of contact, initially in 'The Lodge', and, subsequently, in Loreto Education Centre, Foxrock. To quote one school Principal: "I always felt better having spoken to Estelle who never failed to say the word that I needed to hear at any given time. She was a professional to her finger tips but a person who, above all, prayed, cared and listened deeply..."

On her retirement from the Loreto Education Centre, Estelle assisted Elizabeth Cotter IBVM, vice-Postulator of the Cause for the Beatification of Mary Ward, and was thereby involved in communication with the Mary Ward family globally.

Estelle's motto, chosen at Profession, 'Your Will be done', guided her IBVM journey of faithful service inspired by the charism of Mary Ward and Teresa Ball. There is sadness in the loss that Estelle's family and all of us continue to experience but the memories that we treasure will never leave us.

Michael Meade, RIP

Michael Meade sadly passed away on the 8th of November 2022. Mr. Meade was appointed the first Principal of St. Aidan's Community School upon its foundation in 1984. Michael was a gifted teacher, most recently of Irish, Latin and Classical Studies but to those who knew him, also an unparalleled scholar of Philosophy, Theology, History, Pedagogy, Music, Sport and just about everything else. He loved fun and fiddle playing and made it his business that everyone around him was safe, comfortable, satisfied, happy and involved. He championed the underdog and was fearless in his pursuit of equality for those disadvantaged. He never judged any student and was relentless in finding ways for everyone to succeed. He was a lover of learning and knowledge but spent much of his energy on those that found knowledge and learning most difficult to access.

Michael nurtured a culture of high expectation and aimed for excellence, but always understood that education meant that every participant had an experience of success. The mission statement he championed, uses the word learning once but the word everybody three times. More than anything else Michael Meade was a good man who dedicated his life to the service of others. The mark of a great leader is that even though they move on, their work continues and their legacy lives on. Michaels Meade's footprints will always lead the way in St. Aidan's Community School, his light will shine through any dark day and his heart beats strong in the goodness of the team he built and the culture they continue to grow.

Mrs Aileen Bunyan, Loreto Abbey Dalkey
1969-1998 A Tribute

Mrs Aileen Bunyan died peacefully in the care of her family on the 11th December 2022.

Excellent teacher, especially in the field of History, ideal Deputy Principal, inspirational role model as the first lay Principal of a Loreto Secondary School in Ireland, Mrs. Aileen Bunyan was a popular, well-loved member of the Staff of Loreto Abbey Dalkey for 29 years. Although a loyal Dominican past pupil all her life, nevertheless, there is no doubt that Aileen became "more Loreto than the Loreto's themselves." Her understanding of and devotion to the charism of Mary Ward as transmitted to Ireland by M. Teresa Ball was deeply held. She led the Pilgrimage to Rome in 1985 to celebrate the 400th anniversary of Mary Ward's birth, impressing all with the preparation provided for the student pilgrims, her understanding of the significance of what was celebrated as well as her unwavering conviction that the IBVM Loreto charism was yet to be fully realised.

However, Aileen was so much more than the consummate professional. A beloved wife, mother, and friend, she brought her wonderful personal gifts of warmth and care to enrich her undoubted professional excellence. It was a great privilege to serve with her in Dalkey and a joy to hand over its Principalship into her capable hands in 1990. For all Aileen brought, both personally and professionally, to Loreto Abbey Dalkey and to the wider Loreto Family by her generous participation on Boards and in Committees, the Loreto Family owes Aileen an enormous debt of gratitude. She will be forever remembered with joy and deep pride.

Sr Angela Powell RIP

Known by many of her students and the people of Fermoy as Sr Martin, Angela died on the 14th February, 2023.

Angela is synonymous with Loreto Secondary School Fermoy having spent over forty years there, first as a student, then as a member of the teaching staff, head of the boarding school and finally as School Principal.

After her retirement Angela was appointed to a new role in 2001. She left her beloved Co. Cork and ventured to Dublin to work as Properties Manager for the Loreto Education Trust. This she did for 11 years. During these years she worked with Loreto School Principals advising on school buildings, helping with applications for emergency works and negotiating finance with the Department of Education for the upgrading of many of our school buildings. She was tireless in her efforts to get the best for all our schools. She worked with many officials in the building unit of the Department of Education and was highly regarded for her work and expertise. Nothing was too hard for Angela. She always went the extra mile.

Her wisdom, common sense and sound advice were very much appreciated on the Boards of Management on which she served - Gorey Community School and St. Michael's Navan.


Since her death many heartfelt tributes have been paid to Angela. May she now be rewarded for her good work and may her gentle soul rest in peace.

Faith and the Arts

Throughout the past years, music, visual art and creative writing have played an important role in the sharing of faith in our schools. This is in harmony with the perspectives of theologians such as Jeremy Begbie and David Martin who assert that a new kind of space for religiosity is being opened up in contemporary society, a space which

frequently involves the arts creatively expressing the language of belief. Resources for teaching and prayer in our schools include paintings, music and literature which reflect the liturgical seasons of the year. At key moments of celebration such as the annual Mary Ward Week, Catholic Schools' Week, and The Teresa Ball Bicentenary, students are invited to create artistic expressions of our shared values, of our understanding of our Loreto characteristic spirit, of reflections and prayer. The beautiful sacred spaces in the prayer rooms and chapels and the daily morning prayer in our schools created by staff and students bear eloquent testimony to this partnership of faith and the arts.





Music and Faith

The dialogue of music and faith, in particular, continues in a range of ways in our schools in our engagement with music which enhances and deepens the experience of liturgy and in collaborative projects such as the Emmanuel and Laudate Programmes, evenings of music and reflection in the Dublin diocese for post primary and primary schools respectively. It is also expressed in Loreto compositions such as the beautiful Loreto World Anthem SHE written specially in Loreto Secondary School, Kilkenny to celebrate Teresa Ball and two hundred years of Loreto education and the joyous musical tribute to Teresa Ball and Loreto 200 by Loreto Grammar School, Omagh.

Both pieces have featured throughout the year in various Loreto events and their inclusion of the contribution of Loreto schools from all over the world in these performances is a musical expression of our international diversity as a "mirroring of the wonder of creation" (Mary Ward Schools' Compass).





Music and The Mary Ward Family: Loreto Anthem and a New Cantata

This international musical expression of our identity as Mary Ward schools is also found in a new cantata CALLED TO BE HAPPY composed by Peter Rose and Anne Conlon and commissioned by the Maria Ward Schule, Mainz, Germany. The composition, described as music "for young women seeking to find their way in the world," is "written in honour of Mary Ward, a seventeenth century English woman whose vision and unshakeable optimism enabled her to found the first non-enclosed religious order for women. The cantata draws parallels between her life experiences and those of young women today." The scores for this composition will be available later this term and we look forward to engaging with this new music.

Primary Schools' Gathering: Music and Faith

Before the pandemic, the primary schools had an annual gathering of staff and pupils in Summer. We are resuming this tradition on 28 April with Loreto Primary Schools Celebrating Music and Faith. Since May we have had many discussions with the primary schools on what form this might take. Thanks to the vision and enthusiasm of all involved, especially Aileen Kennedy and Sr Maria Hyland, we have a venue (Rathfarnham) and details of the music for the programme scheduled for 28 April 2023. We are fortunate to be able to have the first part of our event in Loreto Abbey, Rathfarnham, the first Loreto school opened in 1822. The Abbey is now home to Gaelcholáiste an Phiarsaigh who have graciously given us access to the school for this date. The second part of our celebration will take place in Loreto Primary School, Grange Road.



Student Faith Leadership (Ember, Ember Ignite and Solas) Training Days

We are blessed in Loreto schools to have such committed teachers who provide ongoing support to a range of Student Faith Leadership groups which have been set up in the school.



As a member of the Dublin Diocesan Ember Core Team, it is delightful to see the impact of this programme in schools thanks to the commitment of teachers and pupils. This team of six people is a joy to work with and we have meetings throughout the year for ongoing planning of events and resources. Since our last account of this work, we have had a graduation ceremony in DCU where the Ember Teams shared the activities they have been engaged in during the past year. These were centred on faith and justice, liturgy, supporting their peers and teachers in whatever way they considered appropriate. This was followed by the



celebration of the Eucharist and the presentation of certificates. At the graduation, we also invited three past Ember members from Loreto Secondary School, Balbriggan, St Mary's Secondary School, Glasnevin and St Michael's College, Ballsbridge who spoke about the importance of faith in their lives and how the Ember programme has deepened and nourished it.



The three-day training sessions for Ember Faith Leadership Teams in Dublin were planned and took place at Ovoca Manor in August and September with other schools in the Dublin Diocese. Special thanks to the Dublin Diocesan Education Secretariat and Scripture Union for the organisation and hosting of these nine days. Ember Ignite and Solas Teams in Loreto schools outside Dublin have followed a redesigned programme which includes core elements of the Ember programme with additional aspects from the Mary Ward Schools' Compass, the vision and life-stories of Mary Ward and Teresa Ball, and Reflection in Daily Life. The flexibility of

this programme has involved core aspects of the training being facilitated by the teachers and myself in the school for one day while other sections have been addressed throughout the first term. The team members then received a certificate and an Ember Ignite badge at the commissioning prayer service. Such flexibility has seen Loreto Secondary School, Wexford have both their training and commissioning service in the beautiful Parable Garden in Co Wexford. Loreto College, Cavan was able to have fifty members, and Loreto College, Mullingar engaged in an excellent collaboration between three schools: Loreto College, St Mary's College and St Finian's College as teachers from those schools as well as three students from Notre Dame University, USA, who are doing their practical experience for their MA joined us for the workshop. During the year such teams have met online for prayer services and to share on subjects including Mary Ward, Teresa Ball, Reflection and synodality. We returned to DCU on 17 January for an Ember Renewal Day and graduation will take place in May 2023. Special thanks to the teachers who accompany their teams and to the Principals who facilitate them. Ember, Ember Ignite and Solas teams are undoubtedly enriching their school communities as they put their own vibrant words, music and imagery on the language of faith "congruous to our times."





Mary Ward Week

Our annual celebrations of Mary Ward Week followed the theme of Walking in the Footsteps of Mary Ward and Teresa Ball with a special focus on the core value of Freedom. Resources were sent in advance to the schools who held prayer services, debates, a *camino* in solidarity with the arduous pilgrimage to Juba for the papal visit undertaken by the Loreto school community in Rumbek, inputs on Loreto missions, as well as artistic and musical events to mark this special week. This year, students and staff were invited to send their reflections on "What Mary Ward means to me" to Sister Elizabeth Cotter at the Office for the Cause of Mary Ward, Loreto International House.



Pilgrimage

The enjoyment of taking part in the transformative experience of the Camino

de Santiago or walking the routes of
Teresa Ball so beautifully planned in the
booklet by Jenny Edwards, a Director of
the Loreto Education Trust, have led to
conversations about a Loreto
pilgrimage. We are revisiting our
proposed camino for staff to Mary Ward
Country and looking at possibilities for
staff and students in our schools who are
interested in this pilgrimage.

Online Prayer for Schools

Our online prayer initiative for the schools which began in 2020 during lockdown due to Covid 19 originally as a prayer time for Loreto schools and later as a collaboration between our Loreto Trust and the Dublin Diocese has grown over the two and a half years to include other Trusts. Most recently, Ceist and Le Chéile schools have joined us. We all have in-person prayer services and liturgies in our schools now so the need for this is not as great as during the covid lockdown. However, people continue to welcome the various reflection times and join us for them. Therefore, following on from our September Season of Creation online prayer services, we have hosted a series of online prayer times for Advent: Space for Grace and currently have another series for Lent 2023: Lent: A Doorway of Renewal.



Féile Rangeela: A Collaboration Between India and Ireland Celebrating Diversity

A Mary Ward school today embraces diversity as a mirroring of the wonder of Creation. Seeing the image of God in human diversity, we encourage the young to discover their interdependence so they each find their own dignity – "I am because you are" – and feel truly affirmed and included. (cf KG pp 6-7; IBVM Call 5)

The FÉILE RANGEELA project (Sharing our culture, sharing our skills) celebrating diversity in an interchange of presentations and dialogue on selected cultural celebrations continues between the Atlantic Technological University, Galway, Dublin City University, Jesuit Order (India), 'Loyola Academy CBSE Senior Secondary School', Chennai, India, Loreto, College, St Stephen's Green, and the Loreto Education Centre. It proved to be a rich experience for all involved last year and our focus for 2022-2023 is Diwali and St Brigid. This project, formalised in 2020 with our partner organisations established leadership and project management teams, and worked on the first pilot exchange projects in 2021-2022. The mission of the Féile-Rangeela project is to celebrate and promote a joyful mutual exchange of culture, race and religion, in the context of education. The project ethos is shaped by defining values shared by the Jesuit, Loreto and Galway-Mayo Institute of Technology communities. At

the heart of the ethos of the project is the core value of JOY, which is promoted and sustained by the companion values of integrity, reciprocity, inclusion, justice, equality, compassion, creativity and sustainability.

Synodal process / Genesis research

We have engaged in reflection on the Genesis Report and training to share this document with others at meetings which will be held in the ten AMCSS regions, facilitated by a Principal or Chairperson from the Region and one Trust representative.

(The Catholic Primary Schools Management Association, the Catholic Education Partnership, and the Association of Management of Catholic Secondary Schools, commissioned the consulting firm Genesis to measure public attitudes towards how schools of a Catholic ethos are perceived in our pluralist educational system. This survey of 500 parents of school-going children, both primary and secondary, conducted in April 2019 was followed by qualitative research which consisted of 12 interviews with Principals and 14 interviews with chairs and four focus groups of parents of children in primary and second level. The positive response was expressed in their valuing of the holistic development of their children, citing a focus on respect,



community and faith formation as the three leading advantages of Catholic schools.)

Conclusion

Similarly, the work of faith development has been greatly enriched by collaboration with our Loreto education community and with the people and organizations referenced above in Ireland and in our world-wide Loreto family. These include colleagues in the Loreto Education Centre, our Loreto schools and boards, catechetical and faith development teams, theology departments, spirituality and retreat groups, as well as those specifically concerned with faith and justice, Catholic education in contemporary Ireland, art and faith, interfaith and ecumenical dialogue, liturgy and the dialogue between science and religion. We are grateful for their collegiality, insights and support. Ignatian reflection has continued to be a leitmotif throughout our meetings and resources this year as we encourage each other to be "reflective and discerning in the spirit of our Loreto and Ignatian tradition." This practice is of paramount importance to help us in our decision- making, particularly in face of challenging questions such as those found in the national and international



conversations on what truly constitutes human flourishing.

Office Manager and Finance Officer Report

For the year ended 31st August 2022 the Loreto Education Trust incurred an operating deficit of €96,045 compared to a surplus of €44,000 in the previous year. The increased costs reflect an increase in costs generally together with making available a 'Bridging the Gap' Fund in the sum of €35,000 with the purpose of providing support to the schools following the impact of Covid-19. The year also saw a return to a number of 'in-person' conferences and the bi-centenary celebration of Teresa Ball.

The Trust generated a negative investment return with the investment portfolio reducing by €428,000. We continued, during the financial year, to position our investment portfolio extremely conservatively.

For the coming year, Loreto Education
Trust is budgeting for an operating deficit
of €102,000. Licence fees will be
maintained at unchanged levels while our
costs continue to increase modestly.

Governance

Over the period, work continued on compliance with the Charities Governance Code and on submission of our Annual Report to the Regulator in June 2022, the Trust declared compliance with the Code. Work continues to ensure ongoing compliance.



The Trust, as patron, also has a governance role in relation to the schools. Under Article 15c of the Articles of Management for Catholic Secondary Schools, the Board of Management must prepare an annual budget and submit same to the Trustees. The schools are also required to submit a copy of their Year End Financial Statements/Accounts. The accounts will have been presented to the school's Board of Management for approval and signed by the Chairperson and another member of the Board. The financial information is reviewed in detail and for the Financial Statements to the Year End 31st August 2022, a report will be prepared for the Trust Board of Directors with general and school specific



issues raised with the relevant school Board of Management.

The schools are also required to complete an Annual School Board of Management Report. The information required falls under a number of headings including education, ethos, leadership, governance and finance. The detail of the reports are reviewed within the Education Centre and a report on the responses prepared for the Loreto Education Trust Board. The schools are also requested to submit a Declaration in relation to the financial activity and position of the school.

The Education Centre seeks to continually support the schools and their Boards of Management in their governance and financial roles. Our intention is to continue to work with the FSSU in providing the relevant training at our Principal and Chairpersons' Conferences.

As Office Manager & Finance Officer, with responsibility for Governance and Finance within the Education Centre, I will work to continue supporting the schools in financial management and compliance on a day-to-day basis, as required.

Northern Ireland Report 2023

General

Although Covid is far from gone, schools have returned to their "new normal" this past year with restrictions lifted and public examinations restored.

The Independent Review of Education in Northern Ireland has published its Interim report. The Catholic schools' community has engaged with the Review via the Catholic Schools' Trustee Service (CSTS) and individual Trusts.





The Commission for Catholic Education (CCMS) was to have begun a review/analysis of the changes brought about by the post-Primary review over the last fifteen years or so. To date this does not appear to have progressed as individual trusts were to have been invited to contribute.

On February 4th 2022 the Northern Ireland Assembly collapsed and remains so. This has contributed very significantly to already acute challenges in all public services. Any decisions that are being made are being made by Permanent Secretaries. In the case of education this is Dr Mark Brown.



Strule Shared Education Campus (SSEC)

The renewed optimism that resurfaced last year re the progress of the SSEC in Omagh was tempered with a slower pace in the latter half of 2022. This was largely due to the collapse of the Northern Ireland Assembly and the significant disruption within the construction industry due to current economic and political challenges.



Following a review of Governance and Management of the shared areas on the Strule campus, all Trustees/Managing Authorities have agreed that a Company structure is the most appropriate body to oversee the shared areas. The Company will be set up in Charities House and charitable status sought/secured.

It is anticipated that the Main Contract will not now be signed until the third quarter of 2023. Previously this had been hoped to have occurred in the first quarter of 2023. In a letter to Trustees/ Managing Authorities dated 9th Jan 2023, Mr John Smith, Deputy Secretary Department of Education, informed them that the anticipated completion date had again slipped back to Sept 2027 (formally September 2026). The letter detailed the reasons for this further delay.

Prior to the signing of the Main Contract, a number of key policies/models need to be signed off by all trustees. These include the Funding model, the Apportionment Model (the amount each school will contribute to running the shared areas), the Agreement for Lease for individual school sites and common areas, and a skeleton Company formed consisting of



trustee representative directors. The anticipated completion date for the campus is now September 2027, with construction beginning in Spring 2024. Full details of the SSEC can be viewed at www.strule.org.

Representatives of the Trust Board met with KPMG on 8th April 2022, a consultancy firm employed by the local council to assist with integrating the vacated school sites into the council's Area Plan. This was largely a consultative meeting. The latest documents re Clawback and Demolition were forwarded to Sr Carmel Swords as the Province Leader. Both of these can only be finalised closer to the campus completion date.

Napier Solicitors Belfast oversee the interests of the Catholic schools in the SSEC project.

Academic Selection Loreto Grammar School, Omagh

Loreto Grammar School Omagh (LGSO) is currently advancing a Development Proposal (DP) that will replace the 2016 DP which committed the school to removing academic selection. The new DP will legalise/legitimise the school's desire to remain at its present position of a 50% non-academic intake. It is hoped that this will be in place to accommodate the September 2024 intake. The Trustees have asked for a commitment, previously

given, to remove academic selection completely following the school's move to the new shared campus.

Loreto College, Coleraine

In March 2022 a ministerial statement by Mrs Michelle McIlveen identified 28 schools in the Department of Education's Major Capital Works Programme (MCWP). These schools will now move to "Advance in Planning" stage and will benefit from a c. £794m of capital investment. Loreto College Coleraine (LCC) is included in this programme. Given the disappointment felt at not receiving the more significant funding of School Enhancement Programme monies at the time of the post-Primary review's rationalization of Catholic education in the Coleraine back in 2016/2017, this is excellent news for LCC. The time-frame for MCWP is c. 10-year cycles.

Conclusion

It is difficult to recall a period when education had to navigate such a combination of challenging episodes/circumstances. Principals, Boards of Governors, teachers, staff, pupils and parents deserve the greatest affirmation and admiration for the manner in which they have and continue to serve their school communities.

Response to Annual General Report

On behalf of the Members it is my privilege to respond to the comprehensive and impressive Annual General Report, which was presented to us in preparation for this AGM. Let me begin by quoting from Dermot's superb introduction, where he acknowledges the work of the Loreto Education Centre, whose personnel "continued to offer leadership and support to the whole school network" in extremely difficult times. The work of the Loreto Education Trust impresses the reader of this report and certainly encouraged me and made me proud to be involved in school management. I would like to thank **Dermot and all the Directors** for your ongoing work and oversight of the network of Loreto schools, and to thank you for your generosity, interest and expertise as you guide the work of Loreto Trust.

The Annual Report contains an account of the key areas of support which the schools receive from Loreto Education Centre, detailing the work during the past year, to which I will make a short response. I know this will not do justice to the sterling work of those involved.

Financial management is one of the key responsibilities of the Trust and we thank you for the very clear Annual Accounts. Day to day financial management is one of the many tasks undertaken in the Loreto Centre, and ensuring compliance with the Charities Governance Code entails hours of difficult work. I convey our appreciation to you, **Melissa**, for ensuring compliance in this regard and of course for your high standards in every aspect of your work.

The updating and maintenance of school buildings is of prime importance in the ongoing responsibility of Loreto Education Trust. Such maintenance is frequently a challenge for Principals and Boards of Management. It is a valuable exercise to consult an experienced person for advice and it is obvious from Eddie's Building Officer's report, that school management appreciates his invaluable input into our many projects e.g. tracking the DE approved works, school funded improvements and keeping up-to-date with the processing of the remainder of requests awaiting approval. Today I thank you, **Eddie**, for sharing your expertise and giving assistance to those in need of advice and guidance.

We now move to the report from our Northern Ireland schools. It gives us a clear analysis of the progress, or sometimes lack of it, of the Strule Project. This year it is good to hear that there is an end in sight with a suggested date – even though the political situation there is not encouraging, I know.



I am very interested in the fact that Loreto Grammar School is now admitting 50% of their students via the non-academic selection route. We thank you **Brian** for your ongoing up-to-date analysis and we are indeed grateful for all your hard work and the generous sharing of your valuable knowledge.

It was a joy for me to read about the wonderful work in our schools in the Faith Development area. My few comments here will only touch the edges of the initiatives undertaken in schools by Kathleen as Faith Development Officer. These initiatives have inspired the involvement of both teachers and students. To quote Kathleen's own words, "the *school year has continued to be framed and punctuated by liturgies, school retreats and reflection*". The introduction of Zoom meetings has been a blessing in some respects. During the past two years, we have all been invited to join school communities for Prayer and Reflection to celebrate the different liturgical events and special feasts.

It gives me great pleasure to congratulate Loreto Grammar School, Omagh on their wonderful musical tribute to Teresa Ball and Loreto 200 and also Loreto Kilkenny on the beautiful Anthem, *SHE, which* was written by two students: Sadhbh and Síofra Ní Chasaide.

The setting up of Ember Ignite Teams (Faith Leadership groups) in schools is an indication of the awareness of the need for change required in today's approach to our religious practice. The commitment of staff and students, which is evident in the time given for training, provided by Kathleen, shows their appreciation of this very worth-while initiative. These teams have contributed greatly to the faith life of our schools and is valuable leadership training for those involved. Their participation in an international project with Australia is a real bonus for all.

The Faith-Development Officer has been engaged in, and facilitated work on many other school activities, e.g. Feile Rangeela, Celebrating Diversity, Mary Ward Week 2022 et al. It also very noteworthy that Kathleen has generously provided extra resources for all these initiatives.

On behalf of all of us and the school communities, I thank you, **Kathleen**, for your wonderful guidance and assistance to all our school communities, to our chaplains and religious education staff in particular, whom I know greatly value all your efforts on their behalf.

When I began to read the Director of Education & Leadership's report, I quickly got involved in and excited about everything that was happening in the schools - the organisation of the various Conferences and Seminars held for Principals, chairpersons, Deputy Principals, Student Councils, etc. I am aware of the research required to access speakers, the work of planning and making arrangements to ensure smooth running of all events. Feedback has been very positive from the attendees with whom I had contact. Teachers' reaction to the setting-up of the Loreto Guidance Counsellors' Network and appointment of wellbeing co-ordinator made



these initiatives worthwhile. I compliment Caroline on the vision she has shared and leadership she has given. Some of her innovative ideas were taken on and led by teachers and students, others she began herself and guided throughout the year. Valuable topics such as "Celebrating Difference" were also addressed and I was delighted to read that the Loreto Sports Co-Ordinator is back in action. Schools are run for the benefit of the students and when I read the 13 testaments, mostly by Head Girls, at the end of the report, I am assured that our Principals, Deputy Principals and teachers are fulfilling the purpose for which they trained, that is to be role models and mentors of our many students. I acknowledge the excellent report prepared by you, Caroline, and thank you for your work which I know is greatly appreciated by all.

I now refer to our school in Rumbek and I thought that the best way to respond to this section was to alert you to a quote from the report itself, and here it is, "Our schools in Ireland are familiar with the plight of the students in Rumbek. Their outreach to Rumbek is extraordinary. The network of Loreto schools in Ireland continues to collect funds and raise awareness of the injustice to young girls in Rumbek. Huge gratitude is owed to those who continue to keep Rumbek centre stage through school projects, fundraising and being the voice for girls in an unjust society". I congratulate and express our gratitude to **Orla** and all the staff on the superb work on behalf of the students and parents, providing them with security, safety and a holistic education.

As I conclude my paper this afternoon, I thank **Eliza** for all her work, done quietly and carefully to ensure that documents, correspondence and reports emanating from the Centre are of a very high standard. It does not go unnoticed, Eliza!

The work of the Education Centre and the Trust Board are immeasurable. I must acknowledge the very important and significant input which **Ann** makes as Director of the Centre. It would be impossible for me, in a few lines, to highlight everything she does. However, on behalf of all the Members I acknowledge her organisational skills, her guidance and continued availability. Ann, we appreciate ways in which you facilitate the introduction of new initiatives and you are always ready to go the extra mile for the school personnel whose needs you serve and you certainly deserve our gratitude.

Finally, we do not need to be reminded of the hardship endured by our staffs, students and parents during the past two years and as I read the Annual General Report and reflected on my response to it, I realised that the work of all involved in the Loreto Education Centre, and the Board of Directors, during this time was nothing short of amazing. I found this quote which puts it succinctly

SCHOOLS OF SANCTUARY IRELAND PRESENTS ITS FIRST EVER NATIONAL AWARDS CEREMONY FOR SCHOOLS

MINISTER RODERIC O'GORMAN WILL PRESENT TO THE 13 "CHAMPION" SCHOOLS FROM AROUND IRELAND

On Friday February 3rd, 2023, 12:30-1:30pm, Schools of Sanctuary Ireland will gather 13 schools from all around Ireland for a special ceremony in Technological University Dublin, Grangegorman, where the schools will officially receive their "Champion School of Sanctuary" award. The schools will be presented with the awards by the Minister for Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth, Roderic O'Gorman. The Lord Mayor of Dublin, Caroline Conroy will also be part of the presentation ceremony.



The schools that will receive the award on the day include 7 primary schools:

Blarney St CBS **Cork**, Bunscoil Loreto **Gorey**, Bunscoil McAuley Rice **Kilkenny**, Kilrane National School **Rosslare**, Scoil Bhríde Shantalla **Galway**, St John the Baptist BNS **Limerick**, St Mary's National School **Limerick**.

6 post-primary schools will also receive the same award: Creagh College **Gorey**, Desmond College **Newcastle West**, Largy College **Clones**, Mount Sion CBS **Waterford**, North Presentation Secondary School **Cork**, and Stepaside Educate Together Secondary, **Dublin**.

Approximately 140 young people, aged from 6 up to 18 years, will attend this very special ceremony, which will also include guest speaker, the broadcaster/writer, **Ola Majekodunmi.**

Founded in 2019, Schools of Sanctuary Ireland is a **holistic whole- school programme** for all schools in Ireland. The awarding of the Champion status is an official recognition and attests to how these schools have worked to symbolise and realise an inclusive, welcoming and safe



space for all pupils and their families, especially newcomers who come from refugee and migrant communities and other ethnic minorities, including the Traveller community.

As well as celebrating diversity in all its forms, through activities and events in the school and the local community all of the schools have built knowledge and understanding among the students and the staff about forced migration due to violence, persecution, famine and other threats to life and freedom. Many schools also boast exceptionally strong language support programmes for students whose first language is not English.

In a **current climate of anti-migrant activity and unrest**, the granting of this official status to these 13 schools is timely. These schools have made a commitment to ensuring their school remains a beacon of inclusion and equality and in so doing, the students from these schools are learning facts, not fiction, about refugees and asylum-seekers and why and how they come to Ireland.

The awards ceremony will take place in the **TU Dublin East Quad**, the home of TU Dublin Conservatoire, in the state-of-the-art **400 seater Concert Hall**. A space typically used for music and drama performances, it will be an inspiring venue and location for school students and staff.







BT Young Scientist Success

For the fourth time, Loreto Balbriggan has been placed in the top four finalists in the finals of the BT Young Scientist and Technology competition in the RDS. Congratulations to Abigail O'Brien Murray, Olivia O'Shea and Erica O'Brien who were overall group runners-up in the competition. Their win adds to the school's incredible success in the competition over the years. Their project 'Can we save the Common Ash' attracted much attention, even from President Michael D. Higgins who was impressed by the girls' thorough research and commitment to their project. Their project investigated the effect that plant hormones have on the fungal disease, "Ash dieback", which affects Ash trees in Ireland, and is a significant burden on the Irish Ash tree industry, most notably in the manufacture of hurleys. The project also won the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine award.









Congratulations to Ruth Cooper and Sarah Barlow whose project came second in the social and behavioural intermediate group. Sarah and Ruth researched the effect that age has on conformity in a classroom setting when students are asked a question. They found that younger students conformed more than older students and that students' confidence in their answers to questions was also reduced if they conformed with the group's answer, rather than going with their own instincts. They were awarded 2nd place in the Social and Behavioural Sciences Intermediate Group Category, which is a huge achievement, considering that it is a highly competitive category, and they were competing against 99 other projects.



Loreto High School, Beaufort

Loreto Schools' outstanding achievements at the BT Young Scientist & Technology **Exhibition 2023**

1,700 projects entered the national competition and 550 qualified for the exhibition.

Of these finalists 26 were from Loreto schools. This is 4.7% of the total exhibiting projects.

Loreto Secondary school Kilkenny had 12 Entries, the highest number in Kilkenny and the third highest entry number of any school nationally.

Loreto High school Beaufort had the second highest number of entrants for Dublin (7) and Loreto College St. Stephens Green had the third highest number (6).





The Dublin Loreto schools made up 15 out of the 92 Dublin entries which is a phenomenal 16.3%.

It is worth while noting the level and number of significant awards achieved by the Loreto schools, as this reflects the quantity and quality of the research carried out and the skill in which the students defended and communicated their findings.

Ethos Leaders' Visit to Loreto Abbey Secondary School, Dalkey

The Ember Programme is a faith leadership training programme for students at senior level in secondary schools. This programme is coordinated by the Archdiocese of Dublin Education Secretariat. Ball and the history of Loreto education in Ireland. We got to meet some of the nuns who shared their experience of living in the convent at Loreto Dalkey and told us great stories about how they spent their summers swimming in the sea. They were really welcoming as they showed us around the convent. Following this, the students broke into smaller groups and continued with their tour of the school. We reconvened in the school's new prayer garden dedicated to Frances Teresa Ball. The serenity garden overlooks the sea and is a beautiful place to take some time out during the day.

We moved to the lecture hall where students from both school Ethos groups made presentations. They shared their experiences of the leadership role within their schools. They also discussed their ideas for future events. The students had conversations about the different ways in which they could promote the ethos in their prospective schools. The girls reiterated that the charisms of Mary Ward; justice, freedom, sincerity, truth and joy are central to the spirituality of a Loreto school and that these values are as pertinent for our time as they were for hers. It was great to see the girls take part in this collaborative aspect of the day.

This Transition Year Irish Language Community Project is in its 3rd year of running, and is growing and developing with every year. The Transition Year students identified that there was a growing desire and passion towards the language in our local area, but not many opportunities to practice the language in Letterkenny. Through surveying our own students, we identified that outside of the classroom itself, very few students had the opportunity to speak Irish. We decided we would organize an Irish Language Feis in our school to provide this opportunity and facility for our local primary schools.

Science news

Loreto Letterkenny made history by becoming the first all female team to win the national final of the ISTA senior science quiz. The team of Aimee Bonar, Lakshmi Shaji and Kirsten Orhue Obanor were also the second highest scoring team of all time.

Following on from her achievement of winning the chemistry section at the IrEOES and winning a bronze medal on the Irish team at the European final of the Olympiad of Experimental Science last summer, Aimee Bonar has successfully navigated her way through to the next round of the Chemistry Olympiad this year. Kirsten Orhue Obanor has also made it through Round 1a of the highly prestigious competition, the Chemistry Olympiad Ireland (ChOIRL). Only the top chemistry students in the country have been selected to compete in the Round 1b written exam on Saturday the 4th of March.

The award ceremony for the Chemistry Olympiad Ireland National Awards took place virtually on the 11th of March.

Irish Funds Initiative

In 2022, Irish Funds developed a unique Pilot Transition Year Financial Literacy Programme for delivery in schools in 2023. Irish Funds is the voice of the funds and asset management industry in Ireland, with over 18,000 people directly employed across a wide range of funds administration, asset management, audit, legal, technology, software development, cyber security ad consulting firms across Ireland. Community engagement is one of the values at Irish Funds. The industry is committed to supporting financial education initiatives and providing access to easily understood financial advice that empowers individuals to make more informed choices about their future financial well-being. Four Loreto Schools signed up for the Pilot programme in 2023; Loreto Secondary School, Balbriggan, Loreto College, Foxrock, Loreto Secondary School, Kilkenny and Loreto Secondary School, Clonmel. We kicked off the Pilot in Loreto Balbriggan on 16 January 2023 and will complete the Pilot in Loreto Foxrock in April 2023. Over 100 Loreto students are benefitting from the free programme, that combines (i) Financial Literacy competences (ii) key Life Skills with (iii) real life industry examples. The Financial Literacy aspect of the programme broadly maps the key elements of the Joint EU/OECD-INFE Financial Competence Framework for Adults, adapted for TY students (Money and Transactions, Planning and Managing Finances, Risk and Reward and Financial Landscape). The Programme is brought to life using real examples presented in the class by Eibhlin Johnston, as facilitator of the Pilot. Eibhlin is the Managing Director of the Resiliency Hub. The Resiliency Hub provides Executive Coaching and Leadership Training to clients across a range of industries. With over 30 years' experience in the Financial Services, Eibhlin was well placed to design the programme and act as Lead Facilitator. Each School has also been assigned a Lead Facilitator from a prominent financial services company in Ireland. PWC, Dechert, State Street and Waystone have all supported and assisted in the delivery of the Pilot. The feedback to date has been very positive. We continue to update the Pilot to reflect the feedback. We will be enrolling schools for the TY Programme for 2023/24.

Genesis Research Report

A national representative survey of 500 parents of school-going children, both primary and secondary, was conducted in April 2019 by Genesis, an independent survey company, to measure public attitudes towards schools of a Catholic ethos.

At a time when over 90% of primary schools are Catholic, the survey shows a high level of satisfaction among parents of primary school- going children with the quality of education being delivered. The data found that 78 per cent of parents were either "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with the school their child was attending.

It also found that there is overwhelming support among parents (also 78 per cent) for the Catholic Church to have a role in continuing to shape and influence the ethos of the school.

The research shows that 'Catholic' for Irish people is now more about the development of a moral compass, having an awareness of social justice, social inclusion, and having care for self and for others rather than the old reliance on religious practice, sacraments and tradition. It is also clear that the advantages a Catholic ethos can bring to a school are 'foundational' and 'developmental' in terms of morality and ethics – building a 'whole' person of empathetic and charitable conscience, something that may not be achieved if left wholly in the hands of the state.

While parents have the ultimate responsibility for helping their children address challenges, they also give schools a very clear mandate for social and moral development, and for navigating the complexity of childhood. They are doing this in the understanding that their school holds a Catholic ethos. Here, teachers are a key touchpoint as they navigate the area between faith formation and moral and social conscience development.

In conclusion, the Church, and Catholicism, on its 'best day' represents a focus point of hope, community, care, charity, respect, and ultimately a sense of greater purpose that builds resilience and leads to a more fulfilling life. Parents recognise the importance of instilling this purpose, and a greater sense of 'why' for their children.
