

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## Welcome to the Annual Report 2024

I welcome all members of the Loreto family to a changed version of the usual annual report from the Trust Board. This part of the report contains a summary of the work of the Board over the past twelve months. It will be followed in late May/early June by an account of the many happenings and activities in Loreto schools in the course of the 2023/2024 academic year. Taken together, these reports will show just how busy, productive and inspiring the past year has been across the 32 schools that belong to the Loreto network.

By way of summarising the past twelve months in relation to the Trust Board, I reflect on a number of key events.

The biggest development, without doubt, was the decision taken by the Loreto Sisters last December, to continue its educational mission into the future as a stand-alone Trust Board. This decision, widely welcomed by stakeholders, was taken after a period of careful reflection, extensive consultation and the engagement of PwC Consultants to provide expert advice on all aspects of available options. As Chairperson of the Trust Board, I witnessed at close quarters, the genuine desire of the Sisters' leadership team to listen to all viewpoints and to engage meaningfully with stakeholders prior to making their final decision. I commend them highly on this truly collaborative and respectful approach.

This decision has already led to action. PwC Consultants, as well as Ken Johnson as Project Manager and Independent Adviser, have been engaged by the Trust Board and the Sisters to provide all necessary professional advice in relation to implementing a new constitution for the Trust Board and to providing a separate structure for the management of Loreto property into the future. The Trust Board and the Sisters will continue to keep the Loreto family informed of developments in these areas in the year ahead.

Future developments, however, will reflect the stark demographic situation facing the Loreto Sisters. Whilst two Sisters continue to serve in schools as chaplains, from the start of the next academic year there will be no Loreto Sister employed as a Principal, Deputy Principal or teacher in any Irish school. Planning for the new Trust Board and property management structure will place a heavy reliance on the appointment of lay people as both Members and Directors. It will be a fitting and enduring tribute to the Sisters that many lay people will, I



believe, rise to this challenge so that the mission and legacy of Mary Ward and Teresa Ball will be carried to future generations.

The provision of a high quality service and support system remained a hallmark of the Education Centre over the past twelve months. Along the way, however, we were saddened by the departures of both Melissa Steele (October 2023) and Caroline Clarke (December 2023) to take up new positions elsewhere. During their years in the Education Centre they gave great service to both the Trust Board and the network of schools. I wish them well for the future. Their replacements, Zhuwau Nota (December 2023) and Sr Noelle Corscadden IBVM (January 2024), have already fitted in very well to their new roles and have greatly enjoyed meeting many members of the Loreto school communities in recent months. The Trust Board is also most appreciative of the ongoing work and great commitment of Sr Kathleen Fitzpatrick IBVM, Eliza Connolly and Eddie Fynes, in their respective and important roles.

Given the very busy nature of the past year, I feel that I must pay particular tribute to my fellow Directors on the Trust Board. As well as attending regular in-person meetings in Foxrock, they have also been available to join the numerous Zoom meetings of Directors that were required at different stages. Their open, honest and constructive contributions at, and between, meetings helped to ensure that the Board consistently fulfilled its responsibilities in relation to trusteeship, governance and as an employer. Having given twelve years of dedicated service to the Board, Brian Lenehan retired as a Director at our March meeting. His depth of knowledge and vast experience, especially in relation to the Northern Ireland schools, will be sorely missed. However, his replacement on the Board, Gráinne O' Hanlon, is equally steeped in the Loreto tradition and will bring a great deal of expertise to her new role. I wish her and all other Directors well for the busy year that lies ahead.

Important as the Trust Board is, its Directors and I are keen to recognise that the most crucial work of all is done on a daily basis in the network of 32 schools that come under the Loreto flag. We receive regular updates on the outstanding work being done by in-school management, teaching and non-teaching staff and Boards of Management/Governors in all schools. Working in close co-operation with so many receptive, co-operative, creative and caring students, they help to ensure that Loreto schools give daily and meaningful expression to our core values of truth, freedom, justice, sincerity and joy. We all look forward to seeing this expressed in the second part of this annual report in late May/early June.



I conclude by stating my strong belief that Loreto is in a very good place at this point in time. Its values are particularly relevant in this deeply-troubled world. These values are real and tangible in its schools. Its direction of travel into the future has been decided. With a renewed sense of collegiality and common purpose, let us together write the next chapter in Loreto's proud story.

## Response to Loreto Trust Annual Report 2023

Many thanks to all involved in drafting this most informative report. I want to highlight some aspects of the report for special mention. The key word that comes to mind is "collaboration" and I was very pleased to note, throughout the document, so much involvement with other outside groups e.g.

In spite of the many problems impacting on some students at home and in society, the school environment is often a refuge, created by management and staff, who not only do a wonderful job in the classroom but also give much needed pastoral care to our students. Pastoral initiatives and extra-curricular activities, evident in our schools are testament to the care and individual attention given to students.

The number of building projects planned and are ongoing is mind boggling and credit is due to Eddie, for liaising with both schools and DES, while making every effort to expedite the plans at each stage – no easy task, I know. Thank you Eddie.

Each year, we are informed by Brian of progress, or lack of it, in Northern Ireland schools and once again we hear of a further delay with the Omagh project. It is so disheartening for the school community, when key deadlines frequently change. The latest news of Coleraine's inclusion in the School Enhancement Programme is positive, even though the time frame is not definite. Brian, you are fully aware of difficulties at school and Board of Governor levels. We are greatly indebted to you for your clear updates and your assistance to all concerned in these two schools.



I wish to acknowledge the reports from each school detailing their successes within and outside of school hours during the past year. I thank the staff members who have led these activities. I realise all the work and energy required in organising, planning and achieving such standards of excellence – e.g. in sports, music, debating to name but a few. Gratitude and congratulations are extended to all involved.

It is obvious from reading the report that the work done by the staff in the Education Centre is extensive and varied. It is not possible for me in this short paper to comment on all that is included but I do want to thank each of you for your valuable contribution to the work in Loreto Schools, all of which is greatly appreciated.

The person first encountered in the Centre is Melissa. She is always polite, welcoming and professional. Her correspondence and especially documentation and advice on procedures for the setting up of interviews for Principal and Deputy Principal are thorough and professional. For this, and the multitude of daily tasks, including finance, I thank her sincerely.

I have seen Eliza in action at conferences and I know that her contribution to the work of the office is invaluable and this document is an example of her excellent IT skills - we are most grateful to her.

It is a real delight to read about the progress of Rumbek Primary School and hopefully many of these students will progress to Second level, which in itself is a gateway to Third level training, and, in time, they will contribute to the welfare of South Sudan.

Throughout the year the chaplains, RE teachers and others receive beautiful reflections for key feasts of the church's year. Loreto has joined with other schools in planning and leading short liturgies on Zoom at lunch hour – this is only one of the many different innovations introduced by Kathleen. A quotation using her own words gives a good summary of the magnificent work she does with both staff and students in our schools, "we have shared times of joy and sorrow; we have prayed for and supported each other in times of bereavement and loss and celebrated each other's achievements"

That surely is a wonderful ministry to the staff and students of our schools for which we thank her sincerely.



The many and varied conferences have brought different staff groups and students together and I am confident that they have been a great experience for the participants. Of course, I am very aware of the preparatory work required to ensure their success for which Caroline, Kathleen, Melissa and Eliza are responsible in varying degrees.

During the past fifteen months there have been twenty appointments to Principal/Deputy Principal roles in our schools – this includes Community Schools. I am fully aware of the trojan efforts made by Caroline to set up interview panels, act as an interviewer, and ensure procedures followed are in accordance with DES guidelines. Which is definitely a time consuming, tiring and responsible task. As the recipient of this assistance, I want to acknowledge her invaluable help to both Boards and school Management. We see from the report that Caroline also spends time visiting schools and this is greatly appreciated and it is valuable exercise for her and all concerned. Caroline, I thank you for your hard work and leadership as you endeavour to respond to the daily needs of our schools.

The fact that Sr Barbara Murphy's, Province Leader, most recent letter received by all of us, including our schools, has given an update on the progress of communicating the current position of the future of the Trust, I do not need to refer to the matter today.

At the last AGM Sr Ann O'Donoghue, Director, was present and I wish to thank her sincerely for her work, and dedication during her 4 years which is greatly appreciated. Two other directors Maria and Phil, left this Board also and I am very pleased that we will have the opportunity to acknowledge their contributions this evening.

The day- to- day work of the Centre is facilitated by the staff, guided by the Trust Board, a group of people whose commitment to the work of Loreto Education in our schools is second to none. On behalf of the members I thank you sincerely for your interest, leadership and promotion of the Loreto Ethos. It is only when the Board Members, staff in the office and the Loreto members work together with the same aim for the benefit of our schools, that we achieve our goals and high standards. We have been so blessed to have had a Chairperson of the calibre of Dermot and now Billy, both of whom have extraordinary leadership qualities. I am delighted that the former's contribution will be acknowledged on another occasion. We are indeed grateful to Billy for accepting our invitation to take on the role, which I know he will fulfil in his own professional and expert way.



Finally, I found a short poem composed by a teacher from Loreto, Clonmel who was inspired to write the following verses on seeing a pot of budding narcissi in the Sacred Space under a picture of Mary Ward in the school.

#### Nurturing by Mary O'Gorman

Framed near a classroom door the benign eyes of Mary Ward gaze at narcissi bulbs in ceramic pots in the hall where shoots push their way up out of that compost womb, straining to reach air and lightto grow, to strengthen, to bloom.

and when, at last, they emerge, some are strong, others frail, all are nurtured, watered, nourished so that eventually they'll

be moved outside the school door: glorious flowers of white and gold, made independent by the care, ready for wild winds, fierce sun, cold.

To conclude I leave you with this thought "Educators nurture young people by care and love and prepare them to thrive in a future, as yet unknown" and this is exactly the essence of the Loreto Trust Annual General Report.

# Director of Education and Leadership Report

#### **Preamble**

The Loreto Education Trust Annual report this year will confine itself to the requirements of company and charity legislation. It is planned, however, that a separate 'Annual' will be produced at the end of the academic year to shine a light on the various activities in our schools around the country.

The current Director of Education and Leadership was appointed in January 2024 and this report will also reflect the work of the outgoing Director Caroline Clarke from March to December 2023. The various Selection Procedures for the appointment of Principals and Deputy Principals was organised by Caroline. Those appointed by the relevant Boards of Management are listed in the appendices. Teacher induction took place in September 2023 and Leadership conferences took place in October and Student Council meetings in November.

#### Conferences

On taking up the role in January, Sr Noelle Corscadden followed the plan as set out in the calendar for the academic year. Three leadership conferences were held in the Keadeen Hotel in Newbridge, for Post Primary Deputy Principals, Primary Leadership teams and Post Primary Principals. Each conference had full attendance and the engagement and commitment of the participants led to lively conversations. At the Deputy Principals' conference dinner presentations were made to 3 Deputy Principals who retired in 2023 and to Caroline Clarke who had retired as Director of Education and Leadership. An online meeting was also held for the Post Primary Principals.

Sr Orla Treacy from Loreto in Rumbek, attended both Principals' conferences and gave an inspiring presentation on the Loreto mission in South Sudan. The schools have all been ardent supporters of this mission for the last 20 years, and it was an ideal time to thank the schools and to share the amazing developments that have happened in Rumbek over the years.

#### **School Governance**

Loreto Post Primary Boards of Management due for renewal in October 2023 included Loreto Bray, Loreto Cavan, Loreto Crumlin, Loreto Dalkey, Loreto



Foxrock and Loreto Navan. Four Chairpersons were renewed and two new Chairpersons were appointed for Loreto Crumlin and Loreto Navan, respectively. The process of election of teacher and parent nominees took place at individual school level. Following consultations and conversations, the Trust Board named the various Trustee Nominees. All new members of Boards of Managements were appointed formally by the Loreto Education Trust Board.

We are grateful to the outgoing Chairpersons, Nuala Mannion and Liz Cogan, for their commitment and generous service of the schools over many years.

In December 2023, Mary Murnaghan, the Chairperson of the Board of Governors in Omagh, resigned after over 25 years on the Board and was replaced as Chairperson by Frank Sweeney who has also served many years on the Board.

The Boards of Management at all our Primary schools began a new term of office on December 1<sup>st</sup> 2023. Again teacher, parent and community nominees were elected locally, and following discussions and consultation the Trust Board nominated the relevant Trustee nominees.

We are grateful to all our Boards of Management in the Community Schools, where Loreto is a member of the Joint Patron, and in our voluntary secondary Post Primary and Primary schools. Board members give of their time and energy voluntarily in the governance of our schools. It is extraordinary service and we are grateful to each one for their commitment and generosity.

On-going conversations on the possible amalgamation of St Patrick's Loreto Primary school in Bray with a neighbouring school came to conclusion in March 2024, with the decision that they would not amalgamate but that St Patrick's would remain a Catholic school and from September 2024 would retain their boys in 1st class, aiming to have a full co-educational school by 2029.

A number of changes took place in senior management posts in the Loreto schools in 2023 and these are recorded in the appendices.





#### **Joint Patronage of Community Schools**

Loreto involvement in the joint patronage of 5 Community schools continues to be valued. A problem still exists with DES approving the transfer of the Catholic patronage by the Religious Congregation to the relevant Education Trust bodies. This conversation continues and legal advice varies in relation to the interpretation of certain sections of the Deed of Trust. The Loreto Province has delegated the Loreto Education Trust to act on its behalf in all matters of patronage and trusteeship until such time as the above problem is resolved nationally.

**Loreto and the National Scene** 

The Association of Patrons and Trustees of Catholic Schools, APTCS, is a strong body for the voice of the patrons of Catholic education in Ireland. While acknowledging the great need for diverse provision in today's modern Ireland there is also a great need to recognise and strengthen the provision of Catholic education. Sr Noelle has found that membership of the board of APTCS, and that of the AJP (Association of Joint Patrons), to be very educative and informative and has provided a welcome re-entry into the Irish Education scene and the developments and conversations taking place here.

The Genesis research was carried out in 2019 and 2023 and has allowed for greater awareness and opened up conversations around the provision of Catholic education. Ten principles derived from this Genesis research and are aligned with Church teachings on Catholic education principles and are used as a stimulus for dialogue and reflection on the lived reality of Catholic schools, (see appendices). Principals and Deputy Principals have attended workshops on this topic and conversations have also taken place at the Loreto Leadership conferences. The 10 Principles can be found in the appendices.



#### **GRACE Conference Freemantle**

Two Loreto Principals, Aileen Kennedy from Bunscoil Loreto, Gorey and Colm Keher from Loreto Secondary School Kilkenny, attended a meeting in Freemantle in Western Australia to research and explore the organisation of Catholic Education in Western Australia.



Presentations were made at the Loreto Leadership conferences and this again opened up the conversation on the ethos of our schools.

#### **Schools of Sanctuary**

Loreto Secondary School in Wexford has been awarded School of Sanctuary status in the past year. Bunscoil Loreto in Gorey has had the title since 2020. This is an award that recognises the work done by the school to be inclusive and welcoming of all who are living in Ireland and all who are seeking refuge here. In the light of the current debate it seems fitting that our schools would give leadership in acceptance and welcome. Again presentations were made at Leadership conferences and because of the relevance and necessity of a welcoming space for our students, other schools have expressed interest in following this path.



#### **Loreto Education Centre**

The Loreto Education centre in Foxrock continues to offer a high degree of support and service to the schools. A small staff of 4 offers support to Boards of Management, Principals and leadership teams, Sports and Debate Co-ordinators, while providing teacher induction and formative workshops on various topics.

#### **Extra-Curricular activities**

Many extra-curricular Loreto activities continue to take place and are mainly organised by teachers in the schools. The Loreto Debating and Public speaking competitions, Loreto Sports Day, Loreto Swimming Gala, continue to be important events in the Loreto schools calendar.

#### **Tribute to Sister Eileen Randles**

An event took place in Dublin City
University, on the University's St. Patrick's
Campus in Drumcondra, on Tuesday
November 7<sup>th</sup> 2023 to honour Sr. Eileen
Randles IBVM. The event formed part of
the DCU Women in Leadership initiative,
Project 50:50, which represents a
commitment by the university to name
50% of its major buildings and lecture
theatres after inspiring females.

Professor Dáire Keogh, a past student of the junior classes in Loreto Primary School Grange Road, said at the event:



"The naming of the Sr Eileen Randles Theatre is a tribute to her extraordinary legacy as a female leader at a time when Ireland's education sector was very much male-dominated. Her career spanned a period of great change, too, and her encouragement of the fledgling Educate Together movement is a reflection her commitment to values based education. The university is committed to holding up female role models who can provide an inspiration to our students. The naming of this theatre in honour of Sr Eileen, as part of Project 50:50 is just one of the initiatives DCU has undertaken in this regard."



**Retirements and Appointments 2024** 

A number of retirements have been announced for summer 2024 and recruitment processes have begun for five Deputy Principals, one Community school Principal and two Primary Principals.

## The Loreto Network of Education Committee

The Loreto Network of Education

Committee has not met since the
beginning of COVID. In conversations

with the Trust Board and with Principals it seems an appropriate time to re-establish it again. A small group will meet to discuss terms of reference for a post-Covid LNEC.

A small number of schools were visited since January but with a longer third term in 2024, it is planned to make more visits after Easter.

#### Conclusion

In returning to the Irish Education landscape after many years abroad, it has been a homecoming for me and I am grateful to the Trust Board, the Boards of Managements, Principals and staff members for their welcome.

# Faith Development Co-Ordinator Report

#### Introduction

#### Keeping our focus fixed

A Mary Ward school today continues to take its bearings from Jesus, his gospel, and our charism, and to be guided by our JUST SOUL traditional values of Justice, Verity (Truth), Sincerity, Freedom, and Felicity (Joy).

(A Mary Ward Schools' Compass)

Faith development in our schools takes place in our daily timetables and structures, in how we relate to each other, as well as in our liturgies, prayer, Religious Education programmes, and our sense of "a faith that does justice." It is expressed in the way we embody our Loreto characteristic spirit, our particular graced way of living out the vision of Catholic education as Mary Ward's "company of friends." The following account gives a sense of some of the activities and events under the canopy of Faith Development which have taken place this year.

#### **School Visits**

The following schools were visited this year:

St Aidan's Community School; Loreto

High School, Beaufort; Loreto Secondary School, Letterkenny; Loreto Secondary School, Balbriggan; Loreto College, Cavan; Loreto College, Foxrock; St Anne's Loreto Primary School, Navan; Loreto Senior Primary School, Crumlin; Loreto Primary School. Grange Road: Loreto Junior Primary, Crumlin; Loreto Junior School, St Stephen's Green; St Patrick's Loreto Primary School, Bray; Loreto College, Mullingar, Loreto College, St Stephen's Green; Loreto Grammar School, Omagh; Loreto College, Swords; Loreto Secondary School, Wexford. Further school visits are planned for the second and third terms. Such visits included meetings with Principals, Deputies, Chaplains and RE Departments. In some cases, we had meetings with other departments such as Music and Home Economics in relation to Music and Faith and the Mary Ward Week Bake-off respectively. School visits provided a great opportunity to have conversations with pupils through meetings with the Student Council, JPIC, Faith Leadership Teams, Eucharistic Ministers and to meet teachers and pupils in their class settings. Visiting schools involved participation in Assemblies, School Liturgies, Input and Workshops on



Loreto Ethos, Catholic Education and the Mary Ward Schools' Compass and other events such as Graduations, Create a Book Project, Launch of the Sensory Room, Art Exhibitions, Concerts, Carol Services, Intercultural events, Pennies for Peru and Run for Rumbek, Catholic Schools' Week and Mary Ward Week celebrations. In some cases, special celebrations were taking place such as in Loreto Primary School, Grange Road the oldest Loreto school in Ireland, who marked 200 years in May 2023 and in November 2023, St Anne's Loreto Primary School, Navan, celebrated 170 and 70 years of the foundation of the original St Anne's school and their "new" school building, respectively.

#### **Conferences**

#### **Mary Ward Week**


The theme of *Catholic Schools' Week* 2024, "Communities of Service" re-echoed our celebrations of Mary Ward Week this year as we marked both during the same week.

The programmes for Faith Leadership teams of students in our schools are contributing much to the spiritual life of each school, thanks to the staff and pupils who are leading these teams. The Ember Programme for schools in the Dublin Diocese is organised by the Core Team

with three sets of 3-day training courses for the pupils in August, September and October. Each year we, on the Core Team, plan an *Ember Renewal Day* in January and a *Graduation Day* in May for the participants. Such events incorporate time for the schools to present the work they have been doing in their schools as Ember leaders.

The schools which are not part of the Dublin diocese training follow a faith leadership programme called Ember-Ignite/Solas. It includes some aspects of the Ember programme with Ignatian reflection, and the stories of Mary Ward and Teresa Ball as role-models of faith leadership.

## Launch of Conversations from the Classroom – DCU – 24 April

This Podcast Series, *Conversations from the Classroom*, is hosted by Dr David

#### **Collaboration with Groups**

In addition to working with other Trusts, we appreciate our collaboration with the following groups:

#### Bible Journalling

We have linked up with the DCU IRC project: The New Illuminators: Women in Search of Spiritual Authority and Resilience for inputs.

The project "focuses on the spiritual autonomy gained, exercised and expressed by women actively engaged in the practice of Bible journaling – a practice that nurtures women's faith and their unique experience of God within an honest and vibrant spirituality." This research explores and interprets women's experience and spiritual practice and brings them into the framework of current theological discourse.

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#### Loreto Spirituality Team

We greatly appreciate the work of the Loreto Spirituality Team led by Sr Anne Farren who continued to deliver programmes to fourth and fifth year students as well as weeks of guided prayer to senior students in our schools.

#### The Council for Catechetics

The Council for Catechetics is responsible for articulating policy and vision for the catechetical needs of Ireland, North and South, on behalf of the Episcopal Conference. It liaises with the Episcopal Commission for Education, other Commissions of the Bishops' Conference and with other bodies and individuals in the area of catechesis and Religious Education. We also connect with the Council for retreats for teachers and other meetings.

#### International Loreto Links

We appreciate our links with Loreto/Mary Ward schools around the world strengthened during the Teresa Ball Bi-Centenary celebrations. Recent examples include our contact with Australia in relation to teacher exchange between Loreto schools in Ireland and Australia and visits by personnel from Loreto Ministries, Australia in July 2023 and April 2024. We look forward to meeting staff and students from Mandeville Hall, Toorak, Melbourne when they visit in



September 2024 for a school sports tour to the UK and Ireland.

#### Godly Play

RE Departments have been introduced to the story telling methodology of Godly Play by Cora O'Farrell (Godly Play trainer and lecturer in RE in DCU) at our recent RE Conference and we are continuing to build on this. Some teachers are already incorporating this method into their teaching. It is an excellent way to bring Bible stories to life in school settings.

#### Faith and Justice

This collaboration between the Spiritan Trust, DCU, the Dublin Diocese and Loreto Education Trust is for past pupils. In addition to our meetings, we have met the Ember Teams from our schools at both their Renewal and Graduation Days to listen to their input into this initiative and incorporate their suggestions for the project.

#### **Shekinah Retreats**

We had meetings with the director of the Shekinah programme about the updated Diploma in Spirituality and the Certificate in Spirituality. This part-time programme which qualifies teachers to direct school retreats is a one-year course run in St Patrick's College Maynooth as a series of ten weekends which may also be completed over two years.

## Office Manager and Finance Officer Report

For the fiscal year ending August 31, 2023, the Loreto Education Trust showed marked improvement, with an operating deficit of €14,053, (significantly reduced from the previous year). This turnaround resulted in an overall surplus of €232,472. The decrease in expenditure compared to the previous year was a key factor contributing to this positive outcome, promising a more balanced operating budget in the future.

Additionally, the capital appreciation of €232k on the Trust's investments provided a significant boost, instilling confidence in the Trust's investment strategies. Going forward, the Trust Board aims to address the challenge of balancing ever-increasing costs with income, ensuring continued financial stability and sustainability.



#### Governance

Throughout its existence, the Loreto
Education Trust has remained steadfast in
its commitment to adhere to the Charities
Governance Code, consistently declaring
compliance with the code by submitting
our Annual Report to the Regulator as
required. Our dedication to maintaining
ongoing compliance with the code
remains unwavering.

In its capacity as the patron of affiliated schools, the Trust undertakes a governance role. As per Article 15C of the Articles of Management for Catholic Secondary Schools, each school's Board of Management is tasked with drafting an annual budget and submitting it to the Trustees. Additionally, schools must furnish copies of their Year End Financial Statements/Accounts, which undergo review by the Trust Board of Directors. Any identified issues are promptly addressed with the respective school's Board of Management.

Schools are further required to provide an Annual School Board of Management Report, covering various aspects including education, ethos, leadership, governance, and finance. The Education Centre meticulously assesses these reports and compiles a summary for the Trust Board's review. Schools are also obligated to

submit a Declaration regarding their financial activity and position.

The Education Centre remains dedicated to continually supporting schools and their Boards of Management in governance and financial matters. This support extends to providing relevant training at Principal and Chairpersons' Conferences in collaboration with the FSSU.

In my capacity as the Office Manager & Finance Officer overseeing Governance and Finance, I am fully committed to providing ongoing support to schools in financial management and compliance on a day-to-day basis as required.

## Northern Ireland Report 2023-2024

#### General

The Northern Ireland Executive was restored in February 2024 and Paul Givan is the new Minister of Education. After years of underfunding and political uncertainty there is a huge challenge for the Minister to address this issue.

The Independent Review of Education in Northern Ireland was published in



December 2023 and can be viewed on the Department of Education's (DE) website. A recent change to legislation requires all post-primary schools to provide "ageappropriate, comprehensive and scientifically accurate information on sexual and reproductive health and rights covering prevention of early pregnancy and access to abortion". This, together with growing gender issues in schools, has seen the Ethos Committee of the Catholic Schools' Trustee Service (CSTS) engage significantly with these issues with the aim of providing comprehensive guidance to schools.

#### **Academic Selection**

Loreto Grammar School Omagh (LGSO) submitted Development Proposal 715 to legitimise its 50/50 academic/non-academic selection intake from September 2024 onwards. All relevant documents are now with the Minister for a decision. The DP process not being complete for September 2024, Dr Mark Brown (Permanent Secretary at the DE) gave permission for the September 2024 arrangement. The Board of Governors has given a commitment to move to 100% non-academic intake in the future.

#### **Loreto College Coleraine (LCC)**

The school was identified in a Ministerial statement in March 2022 as earmarked for a new school and a move to "Advance in Planning" was confirmed for the school

with the restoration of the Northern Ireland Assembly. This forms part of DE's Major Capital Works Programme (MCWP)

#### **Strule Shared Education Campus**

(SSEC) Website: www.strule.org

John Smith stepped down from his role in SSEC and was replaced by Suzanne Kingon. She quickly "decided to carry out a review of the proposed ownership, governance and funding arrangements of the campus, particularly the shared areas". The outcome of this review was presented to the Managing Authority Liaison Group (MALG) members at a meeting on 5th February 2024 and informed via documents MALG 95 and 96. DE's proposals would see it retain landlordship of the shared areas and commission the Education Authority (EA) to provide facilities management. Funding would be provided directly by DE to EA and would be ring-fenced. Schools' financial contributions would be restricted to the upkeep of the external sports facilities only. The proposals have been widely welcomed and welcomed also at the LET meeting on 4th March 2024 with reference to favourable assessment from Napier Solicitors Belfast.

DE have ear-marked mid-May as the date for the signing of the Main Works Contract and therefore the date by which DE's proposals would be agreed by Managing Authorities/Trustees and schools.



In a statement made on 12<sup>th</sup> March 2024, Minister Givan said that as costs have risen significantly, he was not in a position to confirm funding for the project and this would have to be referred to the Northern Ireland Assembly.

Gráinne O Hanlon had kindly accepted the position of Interim Director on the Skeleton Company but given the proposals above, this position is no longer required.

**Vacated Sites** 

A "Call for Sites" submission process has been issued by Omagh and Fermanagh District Council (OFDC). This is a process that seeks to integrate the vacated school sites into the Council's Area Plan. Loreto has consistently expressed the desire to have its site used in a manner consistent with its ethos.

#### The Future

LCC and LGSO were greatly relieved with the decision taken by the Loreto Sisters in December 2023 re the future direction of the Family of Loreto Schools. On March 21<sup>st</sup> 2024 it was announced that £150 million has been allocated to the Strule Shared Education campus in Omagh


