Saints tell us what matters most in life is not what we earn or own, not the job we have or the people we know.

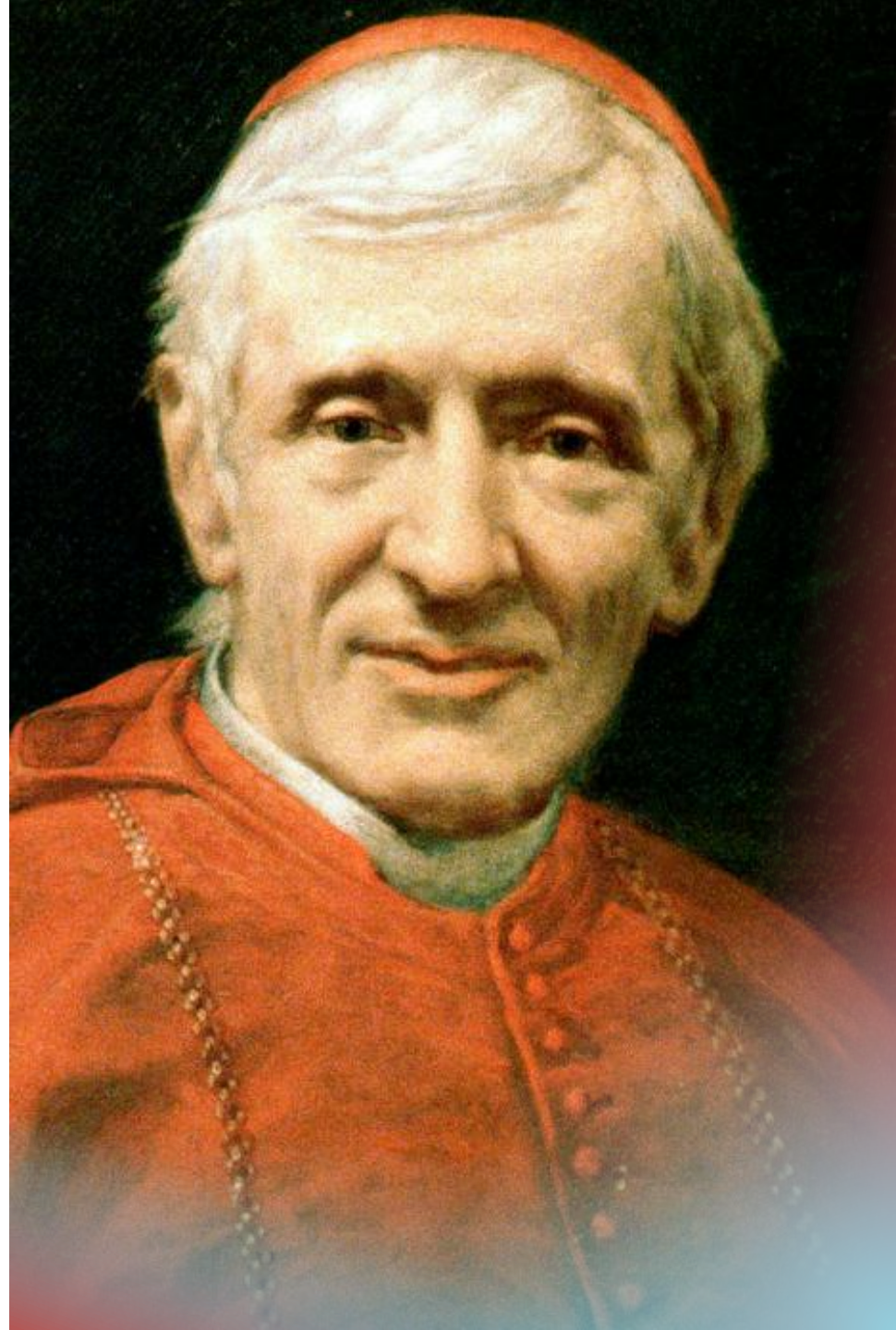
What really matters is how much we love God, others, and ourselves, and how well we show that love in all we do.

2 November All Souls' Day

*All Souls' Day,
and throughout the month of
November,
is traditionally the time in the
Church
when we remember
our loved ones who have died.*



2 November All Souls' Day

November is the month when we reflect upon more personal experiences of loss, the loss of significant people in our lives, people who have journeyed with us, who gave us love and whom we loved in return.

The commemoration of All Souls is a day when we do that in a special way.

We feel a sense of communion with our faithful departed.

As followers of the risen Lord, we believe that our faithful have not just departed from us but have also returned to God, from whom they came. We understand death as a door through which we pass back to the source of our being, the Creator of all life.

We also believe that our loved ones, in passing over into God, do not break their communion with us. Even though they have departed from us, they remain in communion with us and we remain in communion with them.

6 November

All Saints of Ireland

- *Only four saints, St Malachy (1094-1148), St Lawrence O'Toole (1128-80) and St Oliver Plunkett (1625-81) and St Charles of Mount Argus (1821-93), have been officially canonised.*
- *All the other Irish saints, such as Saints Patrick, Brigid, and Colmcille, are saints, as it were, by acclamation of the local Church.*
- *The scope of this feast is wider as it includes those who had a reputation for holiness and whose causes for canonisation have not yet been completed.*
- *It also includes those whose lives of sanctity were known only to their families, friends or members of their parish diocese or religious community.*

Reflection on Grief (John O'Donohue)

Reflections on Grief (continued)

The departed is now no longer restricted to any one place and can be with you any place you are. It is good to know the blessings of this presence.

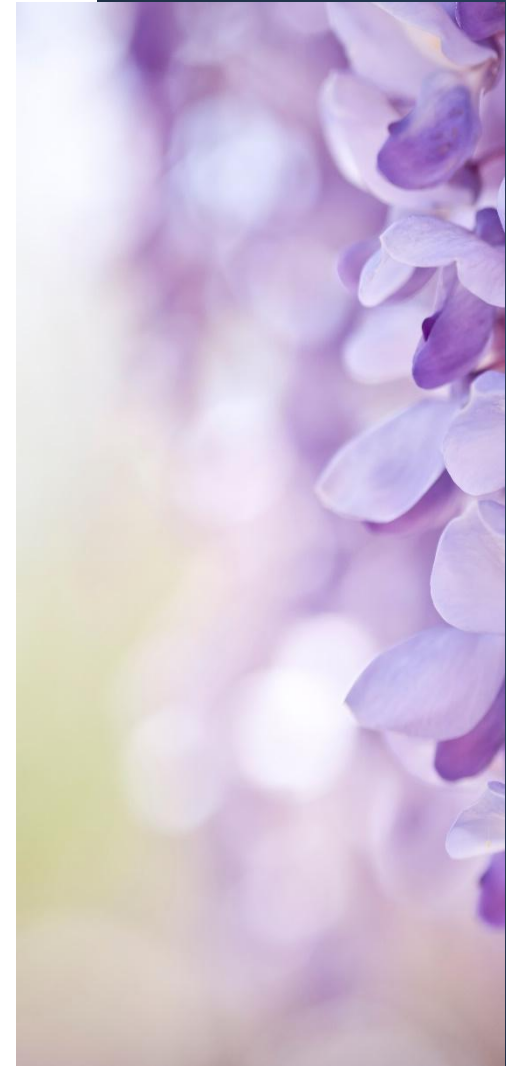
May the God of gentleness be with you,

Amen.

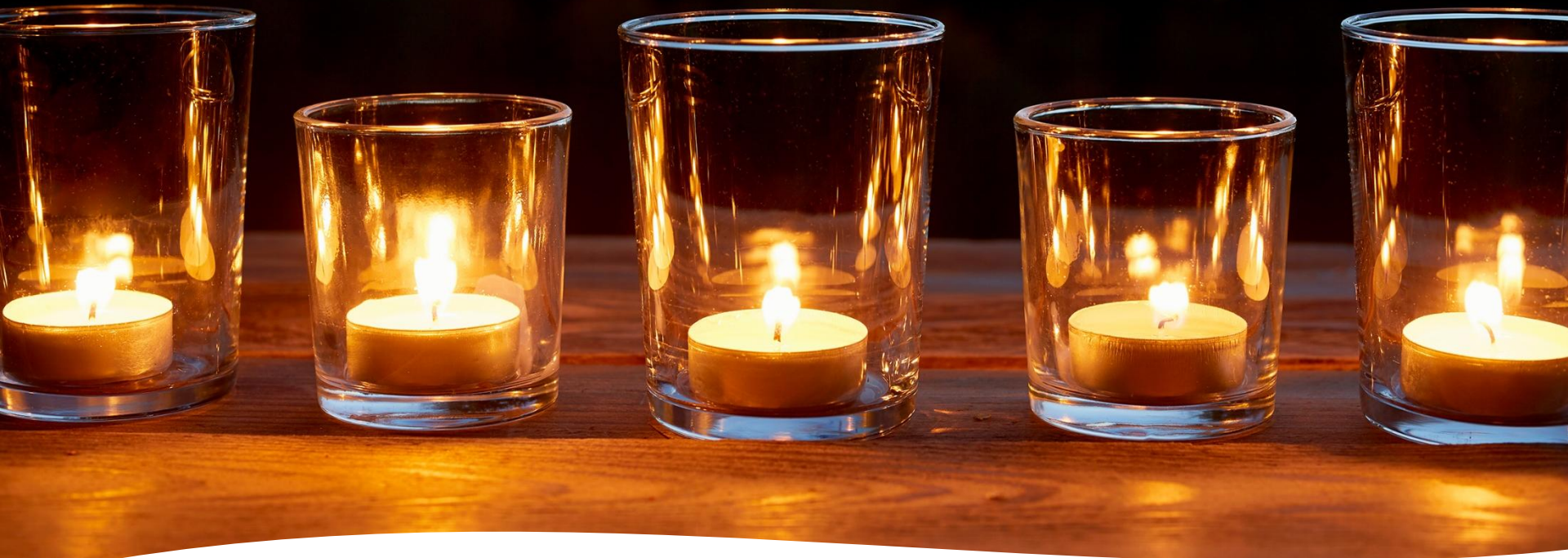

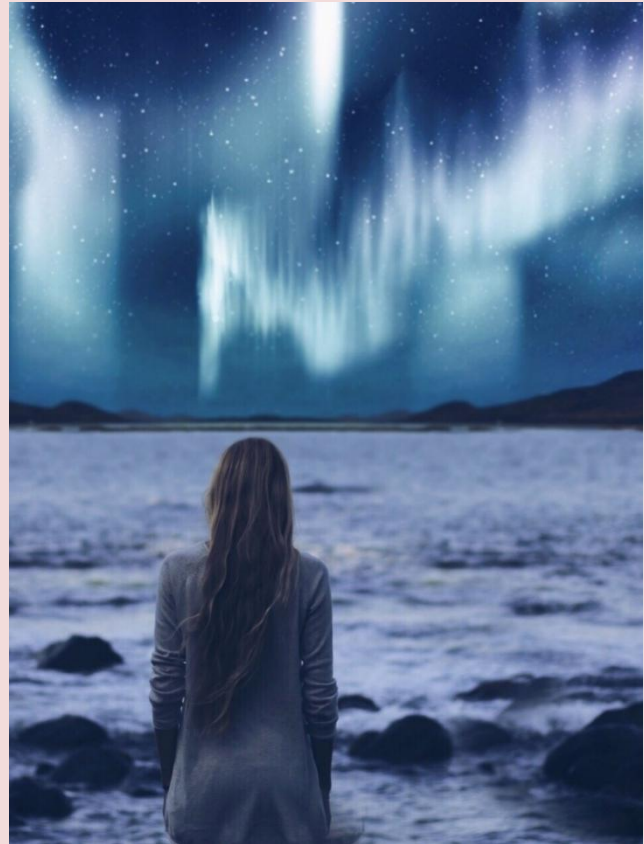

lonely without you.

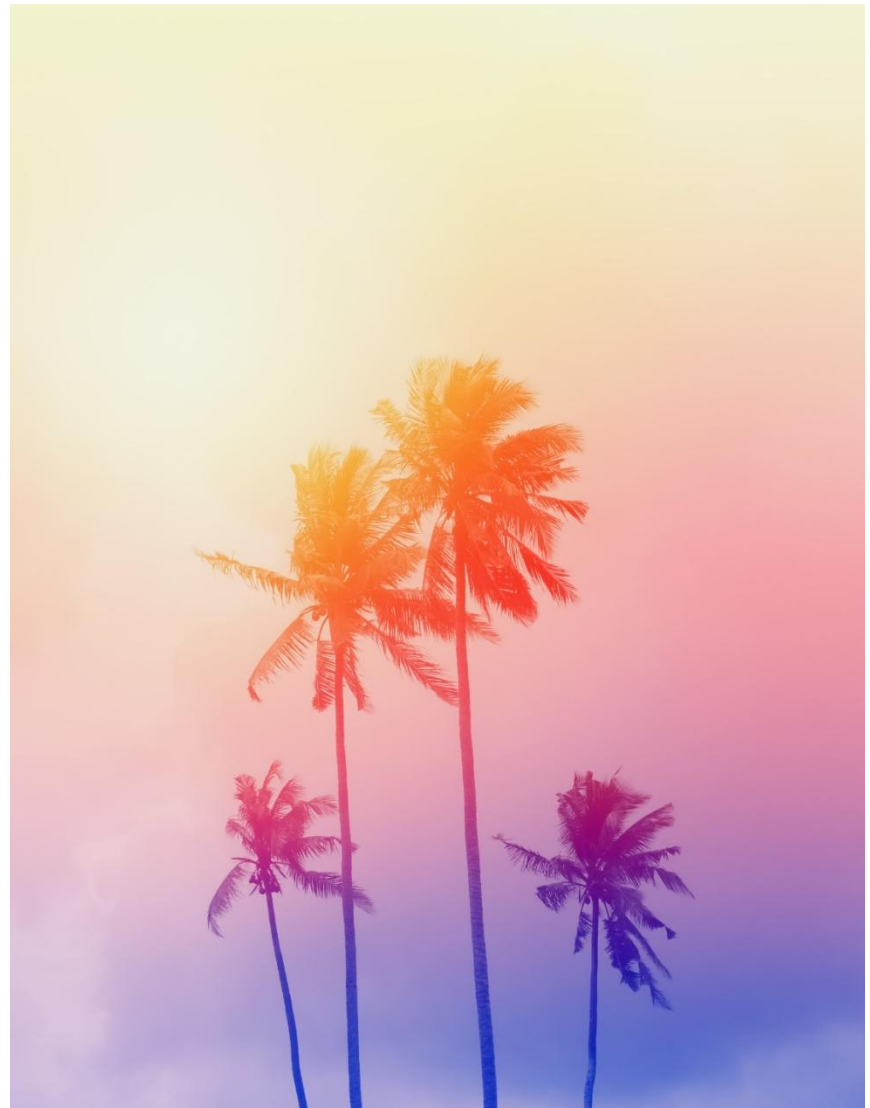
You would want us to find

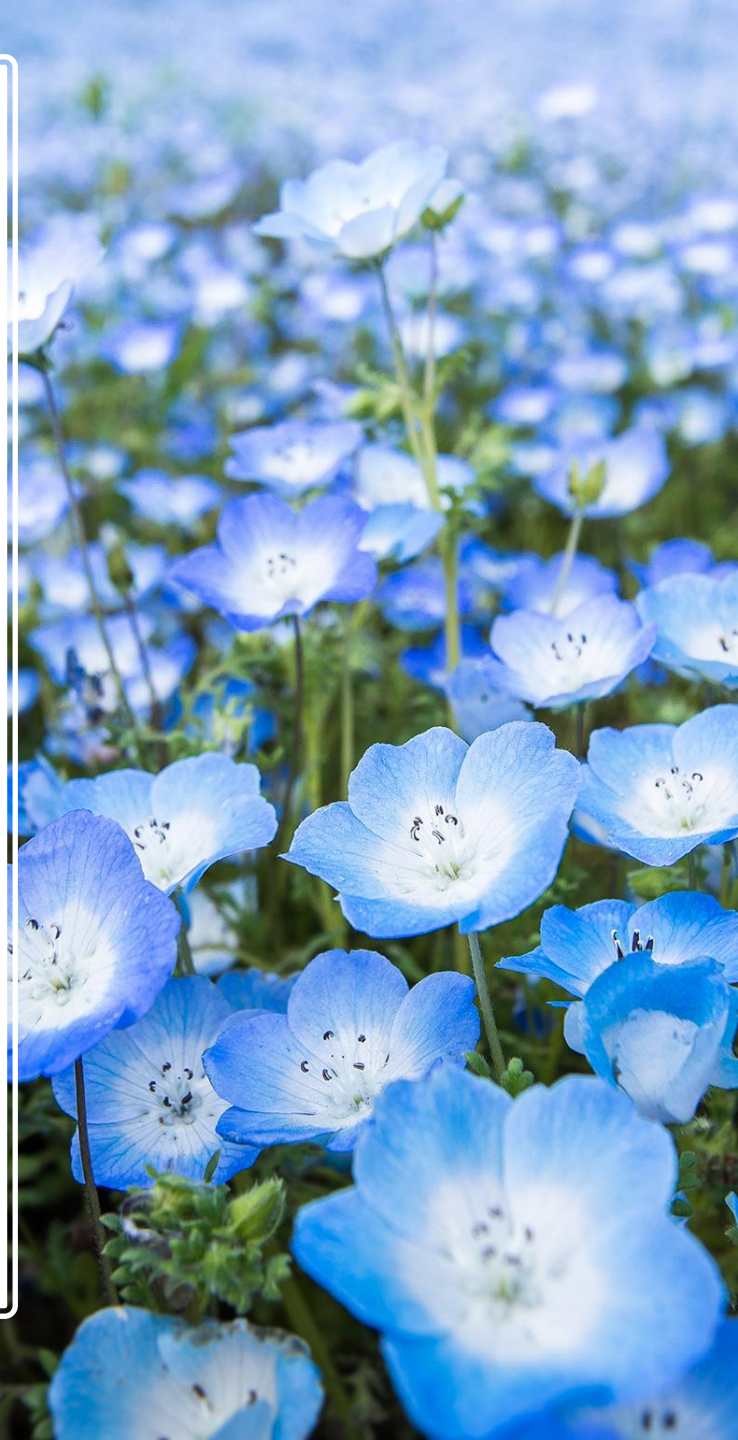
Your heart can be empty because you can't

and turn your back.

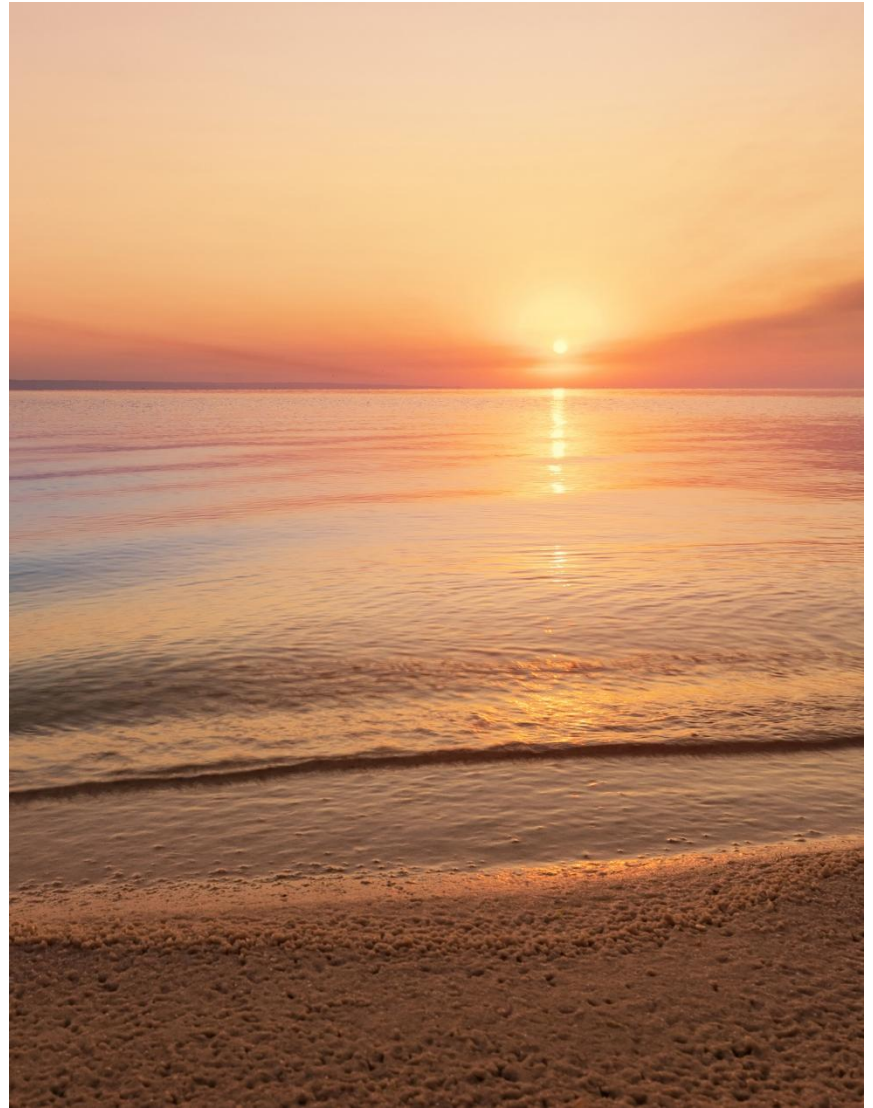
Or you can do what they would want: smile,

Hold me to your heart


God of compassion,

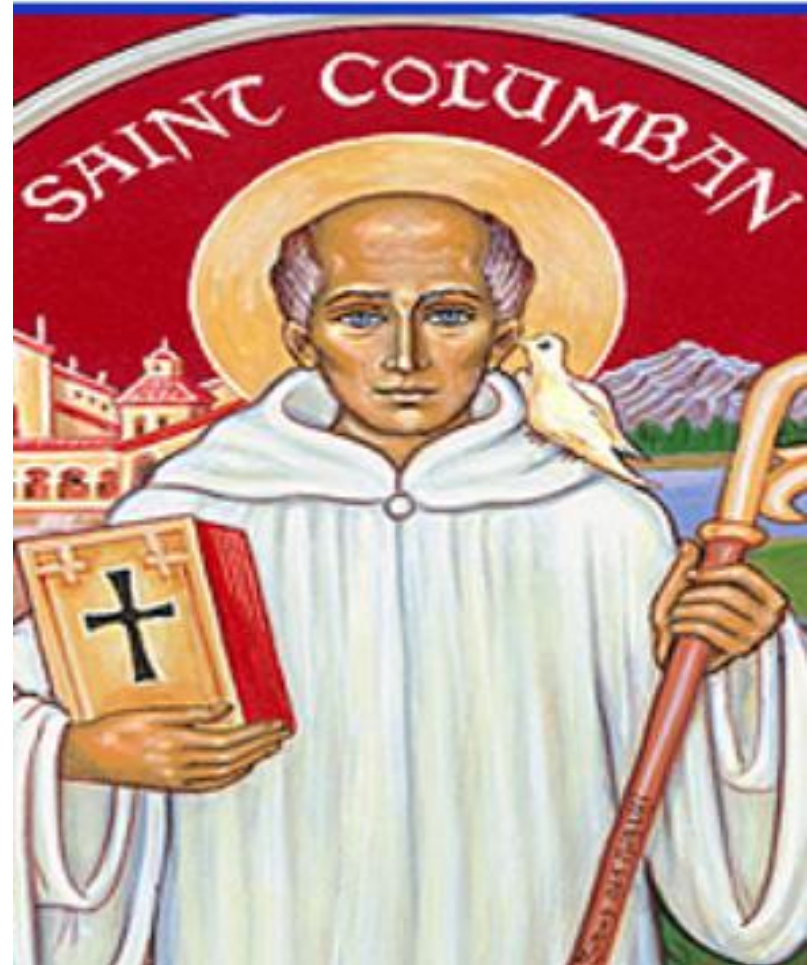

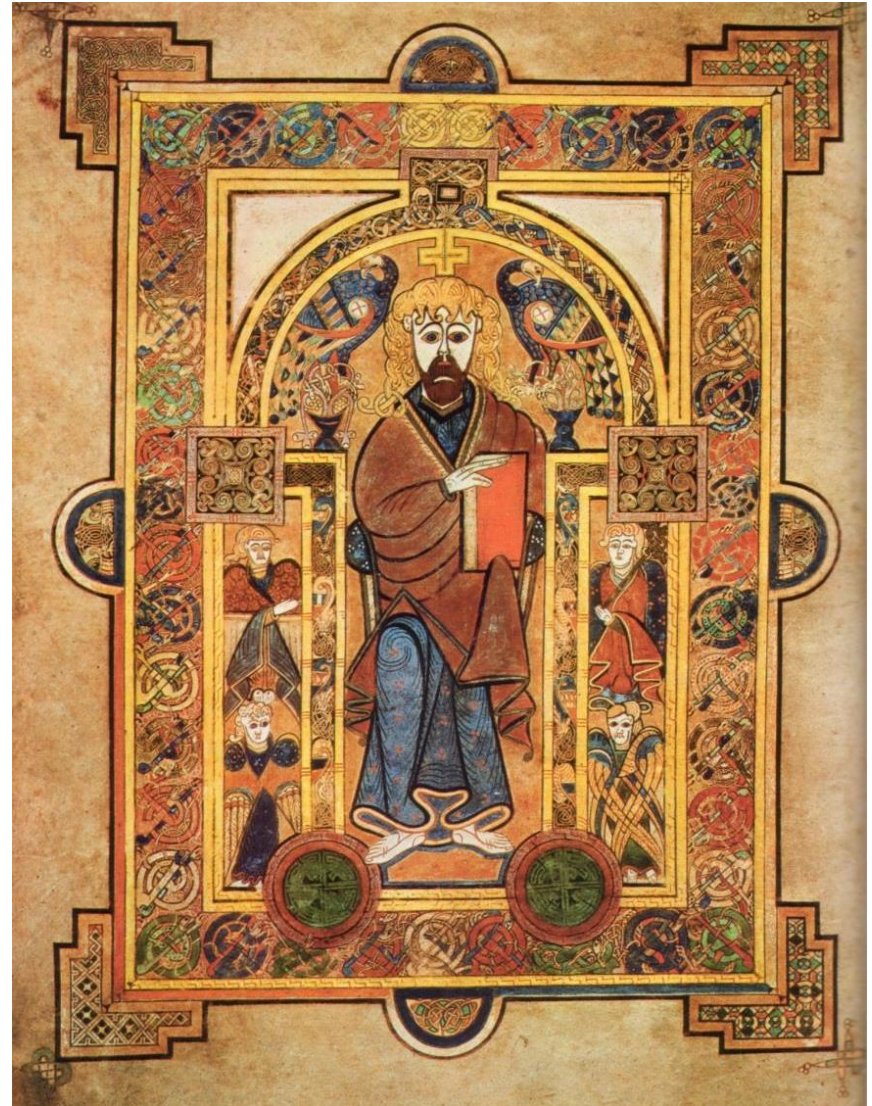
St Columban Abbot and Missionary 23 November

Feast of Christ the King November 24th

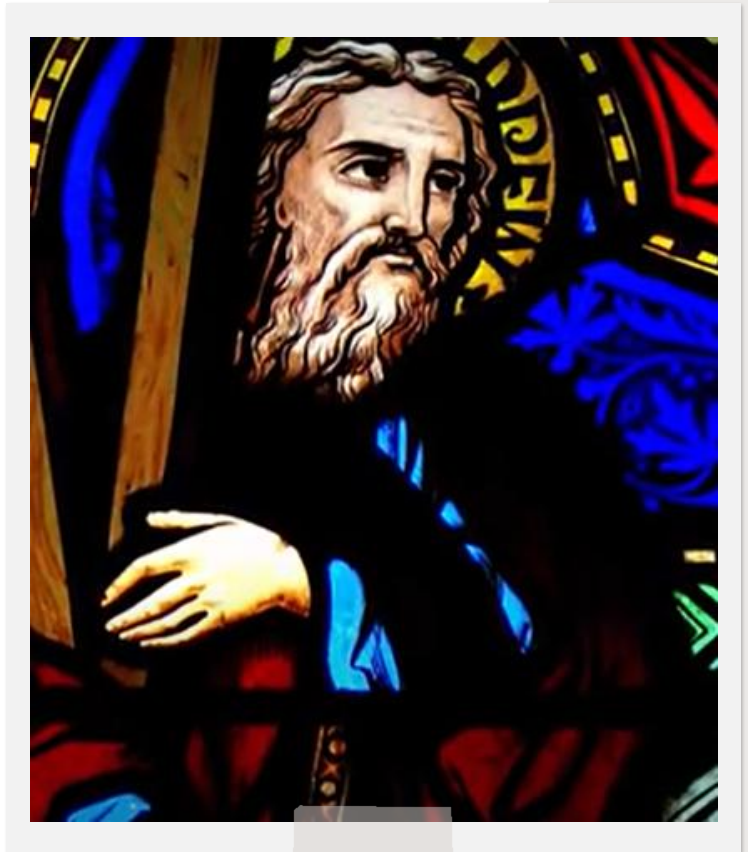
- The Feast of Christ the King is celebrated on the final Sunday of Ordinary Time, which is the last Sunday before Advent begins.

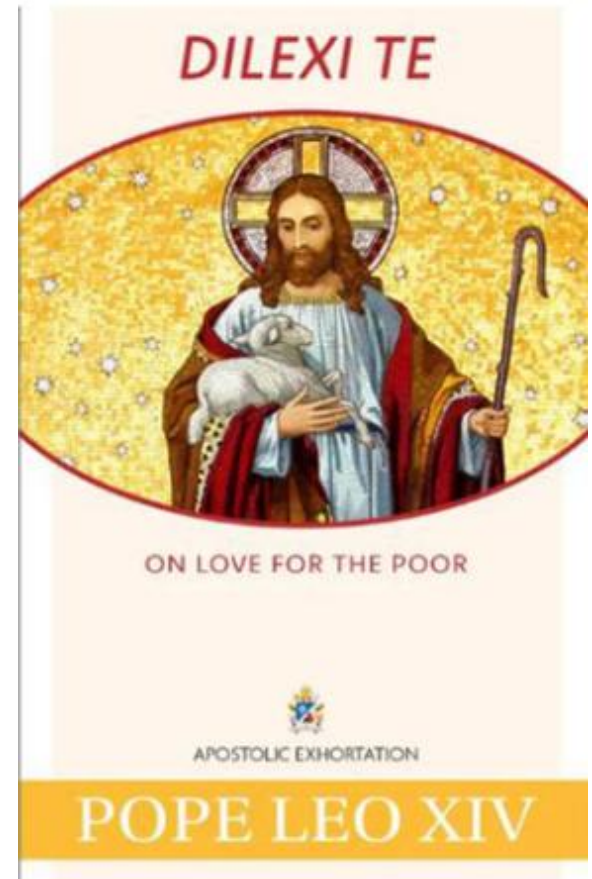

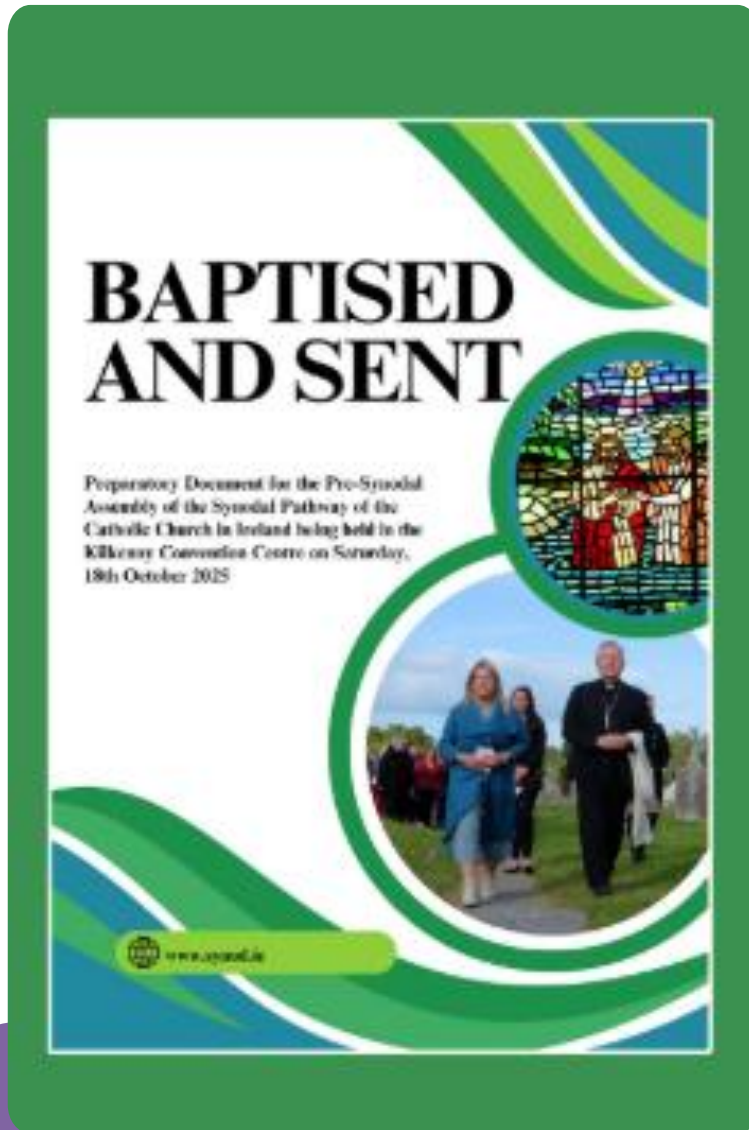
